



- Shiloh Monument: Buddy Ellis, of the W.P. Rogers Camp in Corinth is spearheading an effort to get a monument to Mississippi soldiers erected in Shiloh National Military Park. Discussion ranged from how much money was needed to what the design might be. (See separate article for Buddy's appeal)

- Sesquicentennial Car Tags: The Mississippi SCV car tag for 2011 features 'Beauvoir' in the middle. This prompted Beauvoir director Rick Forte to ask that a motion be made that the Davis shrine gets some profits from this year's sales. This idea prompted some mildly emotional discussion. The original purpose of the car tag was to raise money for battleflag preservation and some members were opposed to any money being diverted away from that program (Beauvoir has been rebuilt, the flags are still deteriorating, etc.). In the end there was a split, with 50% going to Beauvoir and 50% going to the flags, with the proviso that Beauvoir's 50% is for *this year only*. According to the adjutant, this would be around \$7000.

- Clarification of Division Officer Terms in the By-Laws: It seemed pretty clear to me already, but apparently some folks didn't understand how many terms and how often the Commander could serve. The issue was supposed to clarify what was already written, but instead it turned into a sort of 'term limit' vs. 'no term limit' topic, with a little conspiracy theory thrown in. After the dust settled, it is now hopefully known that: The Division Commander can serve two, two-year terms consecutively (four years total). He could then sit out two years, then come back and be elected for another two-year term. *He can only serve 'consecutive terms' once*. Theoretically he could then sit out every two years and keep being elected to office if he was a REAL popular guy.

All in all, this year's convention was a success and the Camp 2140 participants had a good time at the beach and casinos, errrr, business session and banquet. The 2012 convention will be held in Brandon, MS.

Dear Mr. Cohen,

I think that your column "Dispelling the Myth of Robert E. Lee" is shot through with "presentism" i.e., the judgment of any historical figure by the standards of the present. Using the term "victimhood", and comparing Rommel to Lee in condemning the latter, are signs of underlying "presentism", the enemy of good history.

I also believe that your opinion is based on insufficient reading of great historical works. Douglas Southall Freeman's biography, *R.E. Lee*, in four volumes, (1935) is an American historical and literary classic. Also, let me suggest Professor Charles P. Roland's recent *Reflections on Lee*. Dr. Roland, retired Professor Emeritus of the University of Kentucky, is one of our country's most distinguished historians.

Your third to last paragraph heaps a mountain of unjustified criticism on General Lee. He only lived for five years after the War, speaking very little of it. As President of Washington College he advocated higher education and national reconciliation.

I'm hoping that the Sesquicentennial of the War brings out more good history than "presentism," and more light than heat.


## A NAME DOES REVEAL A TRUTH

As any parent will tell you, naming a child can be a very stressful and important part of parenting. Indeed, the first thing we usually learn about a person is his name. What is true in the life of a family is just as true in the political life of a nation.

Just after the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War, circa 1936, a small group of American leftist, i.e., communists, socialists, and other "progressives" established what was to become known as "The Lincoln Brigade". The Lincoln Brigade consisted of American volunteers who served in Spain supporting the Marxist government. The Marxist Spanish government was fighting against General Francisco Franco leader of the Fascist element in Spain. It should be obvious that both sides of this civil war were socialist and were advocates of big government. Regardless of which side won the war, big government was the victor and individual liberty the loser.

As has been demonstrated in both *Red Republicans and Lincoln's Marxists* and *Lincoln Uber Alles*, early American socialist and communists had a great affinity for Abraham Lincoln. With their long



history of love for Lincoln is it any wonder that radical leftist in 1936 adopted the name of "Lincoln," for the brigade of volunteers? To this day, the supporters and admirers of The Lincoln Brigade support all the trendy left-wing ideas and movements that promote big government. Lincoln's

support by Marxists and socialists in the 1860's has been transformed into Marxists and socialists using Lincoln's name today to advance their left-wing agenda.

Even though The Lincoln Brigade fought against Fascists in the Spanish Civil War, Hitler embraced the philosophy of Lincoln as it relates to State's Rights and national sovereignty. In his book, *Mein Kampf*, Hitler virtually quotes Lincoln in his defense of building a strong "indivisible" German nation. In 1861 Lincoln proclaimed that the States of the American Union had never been "sovereign". In speaking of the American Union in his book, Hitler states: "Originally these states did not and could not possess sovereign rights of their own". In defense of his invasion of the States of the American Union, Lincoln stated that it was the Union that had created the States "such as they are".

In *Mein Kampf* Hitler noted that the States of the American Union could not be sovereign because "...it was the Union that created most of these so-called states". In his book Hitler, like Lincoln, makes it clear that he is an advocate of a strong indivisible republic.

Hitler was so much opposed to the idea of secession that he and his Nazi followers launched their first attempt to take over a German state to prevent its secession from the German Federal Republic. Obviously Hitler in 1923 had no more hesitation at using military force to prevent a people from exercising their right of self-determination than Lincoln did in 1861. "Government by the consent of the governed" is what self-determination is called in the Declaration of Independence. It seems that neither Lincoln nor Hitler approved of that famous declaration.

After the defeat of Nazism in 1945 an American Veteran of World War II established the American Nazi Party. The name of that American, who was a distinguished American Veteran of both World War Two and the Korean War, was George Lincoln Rockwell. Rockwell was born in Central Illinois, not far from where Lincoln got his start in politics, and educated at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island. It should be noted that Brown University was named in honor of an infamous Yankee slave-trader. Once again we see that the name of Lincoln associated with those elements that advocate big government. Big government is the antithesis of individual liberty.

Also in the American context, big government is THE enemy of limited government, that is, State's Rights. Whether one is speaking of Marx, Engels, Hitler, or Lincoln, the title of big government advocate is a perfect fit. Unfortunately most "conservative" commentators, Beck, Limbaugh, Hannity or any number of such right-wing talking heads view Lincoln as a defender of limited government. Yet, it was Lincoln who drew the support of radical socialists, Karl Marx and Fredrick Engels during the so-called "Civil War."

After Lincoln's death it was radical socialist, communists and nazis who identified with Lincoln and it was Hitler who advocated the policies of Lincoln for Germany. When will "our" conservative commentators face the truth about Lincoln, America's number one Fascist? Perhaps we should simply refer to Lincoln as "America's Fascist Founding Father!"
