## WI Legislative Update

State Representative 18th Assembly District And Milwaukee City Attorney

I am deeply grateful for the overwhelming support you have shown me throughout the City Attorney race. I want to express my heartfelt appreciation for each of you who came out to support my candidacy. It is a privilege to have your confidence, and I am committed to proving worthy of it. I'd also like to congratulate Alderwoman Sharleen Moore and County Supervisor Sky Capriolo on their elections to serve Martin Drive in their respective capacities.

While my focus will be on fulfilling the duties of City Attorney, I will continue to retain my seat as your representative until the upcoming elections. There will be a partisan primary in August, a general election in November, and the newly elected Representative will take office in January of 2025. Until then, or until a majority party representative resigns, I will continue to serve as your representative.

This decision stems from the critical need to maintain the balance of power in our state legislature. The recent election of Representative Marisabel Cabrera to the position of circuit judge for Milwaukee County has shifted the political landscape. Judges are prohibited from serving in both capacities, so Judge-elect Cabrera must resign her legislative seat by August 1st. This will bring the margin of preventing a veto over-

ride super-majority to only one seat.

I know many neighbors have expressed this, but I would be remiss if I didn't take the opportunity to publicly thank Alderman Michael Murphy for his dedicated service to our city. Alderman Murphy has always been the most responsive and intelligent member of the City Council that I have worked with. Thank you, Alderman Murphy, and best of luck in your future endeavors.

As I step into the role of City Attorney, I bring with

me the knowledge and experience gained from my years as a lawyer and legislator. I am dedicated to leveraging this background to serve our city and its residents to the best of my ability. Every decision I make will be guided by the principles of fairness, justice, and the betterment of our community. Together, we will strive to create a safer, more equitable Milwaukee for all its residents. I'm excited to continue to work with Martin Drive residents in this new capacity.



I am convinced, if given the chance, especially in light of new legislative maps and a likely narrowing majority, we would see the passage of harmful legislation that Governor Evers has diligently blocked. I cannot, in good con-

## Community Garden Update by Jerry Burns

The first day back in the garden in the spring is always a time full of hope for the future and for new beginnings. This was particularly the case when the members and supporters of the Martin Drive Community Garden met on April 20 for the annual spring clean-up and meet-and-greet.

This year was even more hopeful than usual, thanks in part to the aptly-

named "Reason for Hope" grant from the Greater Milwaukee Foundation, with the Near West Side Partners acting as our fiscal agent. The grant will enable us to enhance the physical space of the community garden, while also making it an attractive venue for presentations on cultural and plant-related issues that are meant to appeal to an intergenerational audience. We hope to follow up on the energy generated by the first event made possible by the grant: the pumpkin-carving event in the fall, which drew in several dozen enthusiastic families. In terms of the physical garden space, the grant will cover expenses for replacing, in cooperation with Victory Gardens,

two of the twelve raised bed gardens, which have been badly in need of repair. It will also allow us to construct eight "garden tables," waist-high garden beds to serve the needs of gardeners who are disabled or who otherwise have difficulty bending down. These tables will be constructed using eco friendly red cedar lumber. In addition, there will be a "Salad Table," also a waist-high structure for planting fast-growing lettuce, spin-ach and other greens. "Salad Nights" are already being planned as a way of facilitating healthy eating, interaction with our neighbors – and regular garden maintenance. These structures will allow us to expand the area of the 46th Street tract that is suitable for gardening, since the tables can sit on the concrete driveway that would be otherwise unfit for planting of any kind.

The grant will also cover some important soil-amendment features. A large load of mulch was distributed on April 20, several yards of fresh topsoil are on the way, and the compost bins are being refurbished, and supplemented with two "compost tumblers" for fast decomposition of materials in the final stages of composting.

The grant will also allow us to fairly compensate, going <u>forward</u>, people who have kept the grass mowed over the years, out of the goodness of their hearts, with no compensation and little recognition. A summer-long porta-potty and a back-up hook-up to the near-by fire hydrant will also be covered by the grant.

In addition to these physical enhancements in the community garden,

the grant will enable us to engage in some important cultural and educational outreach presentations. Local residents, especially young people, will be hired to coordinate presentations by local resource people on topics such as eco-friendly pest-management, environmentally-safe weed control, complementary planting, and succession-planting.

Intercultural events are also being planned, and a presentation in the fall about the concept of "offrenda" for the Day of the Dead is already being scheduled.

Thanks to the grant, we will be able to continue the practice of offering garden beds to neigh-

bors at a rate far below that of most other neighborhoods. The low cost of \$25 will secure a plot, and if the garden is weeded at the end of the growing season, and if the gardener puts in some expected "sweat equity," the cost will be waived for the following year (one year only).

There may still be some plots available, so please contact Garden Coordinator Jerry Burns at jerryvrb@sbcglobal.net if you're interested in having a plot this summer. Alternatively, you can contact one of the other members of the Garden Coordinating Committee, Jacqueline Ward or Elise Forer.

This area on 46th Street has been the setting over the years for many uplifting events—the annual picnic, movie nights, sing-alongs, youth activities—and we are happy that this generous grant from the Greater Milwaukee Foundation, supported by the Near West Side Partners, will help to make this small tract of land an even more inviting and sustainable space in the future.



## Congress Women Gwenn Moore's Update From Her Email Communications

I am writing to keep you up to date on some exciting updates on student debt relief. I know how a crushing burden of student debt makes it hard for people to build a future for themselves and their families. I am committed to reducing that burden to lower costs for families like yours.

Right now, I encourage you to learn more about options for student debt cancellation – and feel free to share this information with your family, friends, co-workers, and neighbors.

Despite the setback from the Supreme Court Ruling in 2022 that blocked efforts to cancel student debt, significant progress is being made through four critical steps:

Revamping the federal Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF) program. The strengthened PSLF program is bringing \$62.5 billion in student debt cancellation to more than 871,000 public servants — including teachers, first responders and firefighters, non-profit workers, and government employees. As of March 2024, 16,410 Wisconsinites have seen \$997.4 million relieved under PSLF. If you have served as a teacher, firefighter, government employee, or any other category of public service for 10 years, you may be eligible for PSLF. Cancelling debt for borrowers defrauded by for-profit colleges and universities. The Department of Education has provided student debt cancellation for borrowers who were misled by fraudulent for-profit institutions and took out federal student loans to enroll in them. More than 1.3 million of these borrowers have seen a total of \$22.5 billion in student loan debt canceled. Find more information on borrower defense loan discharges HERE.

Cancelling debt for borrowers with disabilities. Borrowers with a disability can receive student debt cancellation via a Total and Permanent Disability (TPD) discharge application. More than 513,000 Americans with permanent and total disabilities have seen their loans cancelled, amounting to \$11.7 billion. Ready to apply? Visit HERE.

Fixing income-driven repayment plans once and for all. For more than one million borrowers, income-driven repayments can be as low as \$0 per month and the balance of your debt can be cancelled in 20 years – or as few as 10 years for some borrowers who have already been making payments for a decade. The Saving on a Valuable Education (SAVE) plan is an income-driven repayment (IDR) plan that cuts payments on undergraduate loans in half and brings student loan payments down to as low as \$0 per month. Some 930,500 borrowers have saved a total of \$45.6 billion through adjustments to IDR payments and the SAVE plan. To apply for a SAVE Plan, click HERE. 

#### Project Clean & Green

#### April 15 - May 24

- This annual city-wide program is designed to foster neighborhood pride and ownership through coordinated clean up. Collection crews will target one zone each week from April 15 to May 24, 2024, and collect up to six (6) cubic yards per property of unwanted furniture, mattresses or household items, and garden/yard debris in paper yard waste bags.
- The following items are <u>not</u> accepted for collection: appliances, tires, TVs and other electronics (such as computers, printers, scanners, tablets, etc.), construction debris, paint and paint thinner, motor oil, and other hazardous waste. We encourage residents to make use of <u>DPW Drop Off Centers</u> or <u>MMSD's Household Hazardous Waste</u> program to properly dispose of these items.

# ●● CAN YOU SEE YOUR ADDRESS?

Many public services, including the fire and police department, depend on accurate, readable house numbers to respond quickly in an emergency. So do mail carriers, UPS and Fed Ex, and the folks who deliver your pizza.

The Milwaukee code of ordinances includes requirements for address numbers to ensure that all homes and businesses are clearly marked. Numbers must be:

- At least two inches high without background, or at least three inches high, including background.
- Placed on the building in a spot that's easy to read from the street, and at the rear or side of properties that are next to alleys.

Building owners are responsible for installing and maintaining address numbers.

## Western Milwaukee Phase 2B Flood Risk Reduction Project Update

Construction has begun for the project. Demolition and removal of materials is taking place between the railroad and the Menomonee River. This work clears the way for building the new levee and floodwall. Also, in preparation for the construction of the new levee and floodwall, We Energies is relocating electric power lines from along the river to along the railroad tracks.

State St. construction will begin this week between the W. 4600 block and the W. 5200 block. State St. will remain open during construction. Please look out for new traffic patterns. The traffic lanes will be narrowed, and parking and bike lanes closed between W. 4600 and W. 5200 blocks of State St. Travel may be slower than normal during certain times of the day. We appreciate your patience during the construction of this important project that will significantly reduce flooding in the area.

The Western Milwaukee Phase 2B project is part of the larger Menomonee River Watercourse Management Plan which aims to reduce the risk of flooding for over 300 homes and businesses.



#### Collection Schedules

New garbage and recycling



collection schedules began April 1, with seasonal recycling cart set-out running through November 29, 2024. Residents can look up their collection schedules online at milwaukee.gov/collection day where both garbage and recycling schedules are available for viewing, downloading, and printing. Alternatively, residents may request schedules be mailed to them by calling 286-CITY (2489) or online at milwaukee.gov/clickforaction.

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April 15 – May 24

This annual city-wide program is designed to foster neighborhood pride and ownership through coordinated clean up. Collection crews will target one zone each week from April 15 to May 24, 2024, and collect up to six (6) cubic yards per property of unwanted furniture, mattresses or household items, and garden/yard debris in paper yard waste bags. The following items are not accepted for collection: appliances, tires, TVs and other electronics (such as computers, printers, scanners, tablets, etc.), construction debris, paint and paint thinner, motor oil, and other hazardous waste. We encourage residents to make use of DPW Drop Off Centers or MMSD's Household Hazardous Waste program to properly dispose of these items.
