### Martin Drive Neighborhood Assn. Members Attend Leadership School

Two Martin Drive Neighborhood Association members are attending the School for Resident Leaders (SRL). The SRL is sponsored by "Making Connections Milwaukee," a neighborhood and family-strengthening initiative funded by the Annie Casey Foundation. This foundation has made a 12-year commitment to this process. Milwaukee is one of ten nationwide sites chosen to receive Casey Foundation support in developing the economic opportunities, the services and the supports needed to mobilize community change efforts and to increase civic participation.

The SRL is a series of 15 four-hour classes that began on Friday, March 12. "Graduation" will take place on Saturday, October 30. Some of the topics to be studied are:

- Techniques for effective neighborhood outreach
- How to access information (Internet, etc.)
- Team building
- Multicultural learning
- Building effective relationships with neighbors
- Building pride in neighborhoods

### Making Connections Through Training

Making Connections Milwaukee is now holding their meetings at the Neighborhood House at 2819 W. Richardson Place. Currently, the Neighborhood House is promoting a 'Life Skills for Self-Sufficiency' program geared to teach basic construction and remodeling technique to a limited number of teens. The program will include three ten-week sessions, taught by a construction professional. Each session will last four hours. Food and beverages will be served. Enrollment is limited to a dozen teens between the ages of 15 and 18 years. A stipend of \$100 will be issued to each program participant who meets the minimum participation requirements. The first session began April 17 and will run through June 19. Classes meet Saturday mornings from 8:00 a.m. to noon. Life skills taught include: use of power tools, build a wall, install drywall, paint and finish, install a sink, a door, an outlet and much more. Pick up an application at the Neighborhood House NOW! ### Who to Call:

### Crimes

911 - Emergencies: life threatening; crimes in progress like battery, robbery, gunshots.

933-444 - Non-emergencies: loud music, neighbor trouble.

935-7232 - 3rd District: to talk about ongoing problems, to talk with your squad officers, to request that a squad check your house occasionally while you are on vacation, for general information.

### **Other Problems:**

286-2268 - Department of Neighborhood Services (DNS): garbage on private property or lot, nuisance vehicles on private property, disrepair of a building (Building Code Enforcement), rodents, animal feces, overfilled dumpsters or garbage carts, landscaping problems such as dirt eroding onto the public sidewalk.

286-8282 - Department of Public Works (DPW): snow and ice on the public sidewalk, the grass is longer than 9 inches, weeds, the garbage carts on the public sidewalk, clean up city-owned vacant lot, special garbage collection, missed garbage collection, street lights out, broken branches on city trees.

286-8350 - Parking Enforcement: abandoned vehicles on the streets or city property.

286-8715 - Graffiti Hotline

286-2557 - Department of Neighborhood Services: fire damage to structure to report, get permits, to find out the status, Zoning Enforcement.

286-3874 - Commercial Building Code Enforcement

For roaming or menacing pets, call the Milwaukee Police Department at 933-4444, or the DNS at 286-2268, or Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission at 649-8650.

### Martin Drive Neighborhood Guidelines

This is our neighborhood. The quality of life in our neighborhood depends on mutual respect and concern. If everyone helps, we can keep our neighborhood clean and attractive.

- 1 Keeping your own property up will encourage your neighbors to do the same.
- 2 Graffiti, drugs and gangs cannot be tolerated in our neighborhood.
- Noise is an intrusion. Please use common sense and be especially considerate after 9 p.m.
- 4 Refrain from using car horns in nonemergencies, and ask your guests to do the same.
- 5 Remember the speed limit on residential streets is 25 MPH.
- If your pet spends time outside, please be sure to clean up after it, whether in your yard or someone else's; dogs should be leashed, fenced or supervised. Please be aware there is an Ordinance prohibiting dogs in Washington Park; the fine for the first violation is \$121.
- 7 Landlords who do not live in the area need to keep their property in a safe and presentable condition.
- 8 Children need to be supervised at all times to help them learn respect for adults, the law, and their property as well as the property of others.
- 9 Remember this is your neighborhood and it is made up of people. Get to know your neighbors. Do your part to watch out for them and they in turn will watch out for you.
- 10 Garbage carts are to be removed from the sidewalk and returned to storage areas by 10 pm on collection day. Visible garbage carts are unsightly, so please store them on the side or back of your building.

- Dealing with problem neighbors and businesses
- Mini grant writing
- Public speaking
- Communication Skills
- Dialogue and listening skills
- Art of organizing
- Locating and accessing community resources
  - Developing and maintaining open lines of communication with elected officials
  - How to conduct a meeting

The classes are designed to focus on building resident leadership on those issues that residents identify as critical for themselves and the families within their neighborhoods. The skills developed in the class will be immediately applied to creating

solutions to one or two of the issues identified. But this program has one component that is very different from others that are available in the city. When these issues are identified, we are then eligible to apply for mini-grants to implement them. To be blunt, the "Making Connections" organization is really "putting their money where their mouth is." This is not something that usually happens, and we are extremely excited about what these mini-grants can provide for our neighborhood association. Please come to the annual meeting to help us identify the issues on which to focus.

The two association members attending the School for Resident Leaders are Terry Bartlett and Sharon Williams. They will be at the annual meeting and will be glad to answer any additional questions or take suggestions on any of the above information.
