### IMPORTANT MDN NEWS!

Our Neighborhood Association has been awarded a sizeable grant from The Milwaukee Foundation and the Making Connections Milwaukee organizations.

Using this funding the Martin Drive Neighborhood Association will be able to implement the following strategies to meet three major goals:

- Increase the percentage of <u>owner-occupied</u> duplexes in the Martin Drive area, especially by first time buyers.
- 2. Improve the existing Martin Drive area housing stock.
- 3. Strengthen neighborhood cohesiveness.

#### **IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGIES:**

#### **Duplex Ownership**

Create a video/PowerPoint presentation to show to community housing organizations promoting the advantages of owning a home in the MD area.

Organize a network of experienced MD duplex owners to support the new buyers.

Offer a \$500 minor repair incentive to the first five new owners who are qualified according to the proposal guidelines.

#### Housing Stock Improvement

Create and distribute a package explaining all of the available home repair rebate, grant and loan programs. Develop the porch light/address plate repair/replacement program.

Organize three-person teams to canvas each MD block by going door-to-door in the evening to assess the condition of porch lights, replace burned out lights, and record porches in need of repair, especially light fixtures and address plates. One member of each team will be a teen or young adult hired to help with the light bulb replacement.

Develop a plan to contact home owners about assistance the Association can give in making these repairs.

Identify local contractors and "handy persons" to hire for replacement/repair work.

#### BRIGHT IDEAS -THE LIGHT BRIGADE By Pat M.

Sometimes the best ideas are the simplest ideas. And, turning on your porch light is a simple way to boost neighborhood curb appeal and limit opportunities for vandalism and crime




Our two-year grant will allow us to "Light the Night" in the Martin Drive Neighborhood. One of the first projects in our grant is the "Light Brigade." The light brigade will consist of walking groups of three neighbors going door to door, distributing information on rebate opportunities and specifically trying to encourage more people to turn on porch lights. The team will be equipped with energy efficient light bulbs and a ladder and a teen that will assist in changing bulbs of needy porch lights.

Focus on Energy has also given us \$2 coupons off the purchase of energy efficient light bulbs. By this process, we can identify porch lights that are faulty or need replacement. And, the grant will provide us funds to replace about 30 faulty porch lights through the neighborhood.

We had hoped to celebrate during National Night Out, which is always in the first week in August, by hosting a neighborhood celebration of the national promoting block clubs, but we got off to a late start while waiting on approvals. We may need to do this next year when we will have so much to celebrate.

Martin Drive has a brilliant opportunity to move this neighborhood forward on many levels. So, please open your door and connect with the **Light Brigade** when they visit your home. Or, volunteer to be on your block's **Light Brigade**. We want and need people from each block. Don't let your block be left in the dark. To volunteer or for more info, call Pat at 933-5589.



#### Neighborhood Cohesiveness

Plan block parties in each "section" of the area to explain all of the above and to organize around "quality of life" issues, i.e., tree lawn plantings, regularly scheduled block-wide clean-ups, keeping porch lights on, keeping lawns mowed, using Growing Power techniques (composting, vermiculite, hydroponics) to grow healthy "backyard" gardens, etc.

Foster relationships between area youth and adults by offering activities (basketball tournaments, reading/storytelling groups, drum circles, entrepreneurial projects, etc.) organized by a youth/community organizer hired to recruit participants assisted by neighborhood adults.

Fund our traditional activities: the newsletter, the Annual Meeting, the Trick-n'-Treat night, and the Annual Rummage Sale.

Funds are available to hire a part-time administrative aide and youth/community organizer to assist in the implementation of all of the above, but the Association will still need lots of help from our neighborhood volunteers!! We will be calling on our neighbors to serve on the porch light teams (The Light Brigades), to organize and attend your block's party, to become a member of the "new duplex owner" support group, to help with youth activities, to join the "Backyard Garden" group, etc.

We have a long list of evaluation standards, too long to list here, but the four most important are:

- 1. Establish a Steering or Oversight Committee to administer and implement the proposal. This has been done and the committee began meeting on Monday, July 16. 2007. Members are Maggie Blaha, Pat Devitt, Amy Peterson, Pat Mueller, Al Seimsen, Karen Spencer, Sandy Washington, and Sharon Williams. We are trying to get at least one representative from each block. Contact Maggie if you are interested.
- 2. Hold block parties on each street. Besides having good food and fun, more detailed information will be given about the proposal and how you can help.
- 3. Organize the porch light teams for each block. We need two adults and one teen or young adult to canvas each block as soon as possible.

Funds are available to pay the teen/young adult members.

An Administrative Aide and the Youth Organizer has been identified.

Pat Mueller and Sharon Williams have spent many hours writing this proposal and meeting with staff of both organizations in order to qualify for their funding. They and the Association are indebted to Mike Schubert, a consultant working with the Milwaukee Foundation, Ray Schmidt of Select Milwaukee, as well as Bob Clark, Joanne Gray-Murray, and Roxanne Defoe of Making Connections for their encouragement, support, and guidance.

This is one of the most exciting things to ever happen to our neighborhood, but WE WILL NEED YOUR HELP to reach our goals. <u>PLEASE</u> VOLUNTEER when the Association asks for help!!




#### **RUMMAGE SALE 2007**

#### CHILDREN & ANIMALS

Petey, a Miniature Pinscher, was accidentally dropped down the stairs by a fouryear-old family member, breaking his two hind legs. Although Petey recovered, his story highlights the need to supervise children when they are spending time with animals. Animals can be great companions for children, but the Wisconsin Humane Society would like to share the following guidelines to help ensure the safety of bo

Society would like to share the following guidelines to help ensure the safety of both animals and children.

Don't expect your child to take full responsibility for your pet. Although your child should be encouraged to help care for an animal by doing age-appropriate tasks, children should not be expected to train or walk an animal without supervision. Children cannot take on all of the responsibilities of caring for an animal alone.

Supervise all interactions. It is important to supervise children whenever they spend time with pets. Although you may have a well-behaved animal, some normal childhood behaviors such as chasing and teasing may make your animal uneasy and put your child at risk.

Teach your children to respect animals. Children may not understand their animal's need for space. It is important to teach your child to treat your animal with respect, and a basic knowledge of animal body language may help. Teach your child how to identify your animal's body signals so that he or she knows whether or nor it is safe to approach your animal.

Animals can enrich the lives of children, if these basic safety precautions are followed. Contact the Wisconsin Humane Society with questions or for more information at (414) ANIMALS.

#### SUMMARY OF MDN MEETING MINUTES

#### May 14, 2007 (Annual Meeting)

Maggie welcomed over 50 neighbors to the annual meeting at the Washington Park Senior Center.

Jared, from Alderman Michael Murphy's office, made note of questions neighbors had with the promise that he would respond as soon as possible.

Recycling occurs about every three weeks. Ask for an extra cart if one does not meet your needs.

William Crystal from Advanced Waste Services listened to questions from neighbors about a slightly sweet chemical odor permeating the neighborhood. Mike Griffin from the DNR wants to hear from anyone concerning this problem by noting the date, time and intensity of the odor (on a 1 to10 scale with 1 being unnoticeable). His number is 414-263-8554. Thanks to alert neighbors.

Speaker of the evening was Joey Zocher, from the Urban Ecology Center located in Washington Park. The goal is to use the park as much as possible, and the Center's purpose is to connect children to their environment through activities that help them develop respect and understanding of nature.

The Student Conservation Assoc. helps to clean up the park; they wear vests identifying them as Junior Park Rangers. Schools that are in a radius of two miles can participate in the Center's activities that take place during the school year with each group meeting a minimum of three times. There is a Saturday morning gardening group.

Summer camps are available. 150 kids eat lunch in the park every day in the summer. Artists in Education work with these kids. Joey urged neighbors to call her with ideas and needs. Four corporations support these programs, including Quad Graphics and Trinity (trek bikes).

#### June 11, 2007

Dumpsters were delivered on Friday, June 15th to four corners, NW corner of Juneau at 43rd, 45th, and 46th as well as the SW corner of McKinley at Highland Blvd. The next opportunity to have dumpsters in the neighborhood would be in July.

Pat M. had several items of interest for neighbors.

- Discussion followed concerning the accidents on the curve near Martin Drive/Highland Blvd. Drivers need to be alert to the problem.

#### July 9, 2007

Needed: block captains on 44th north of Juneau, 46th Street, and the west side of Highland Blvd. Please contact Maggie if you can help. Requirements are about 1 - 2 hours a month to: attend the monthly meeting, listen to neighbors' concerns, provide them with information needed and be a spokesperson on their behalf at the monthly mtgs. All neighbors are encouraged to attend the monthly meeting, but it is most beneficial to the block captains.

Our neighborhood has received a grant from the Milwaukee Foundation and Making Connections to support owner occupied duplexes and the beautification initiative (see article on page 1). Pat M. and Sharon W. presented the details of this proposal. We are grateful for the dedication of Pat and Sharon, Alderman Michael Murphy enlightened us about a new link on the city website providing information about inspections of restaurants. He will be holding a meeting about budget items including the boulevards. Neighbors voiced their opinions about the value of the boulevards as a quality of life issue. He encouraged us to watch for these meeting notices and to participate in the meetings.

A healthy discussion about traffic and drivers followed. The alderman made suggestions about improvements that could be made. One of the hot

spots is Highland at Vliet. People will drive through McKinley and 42<sup>nd</sup> St. in order to avoid the stoplight. Speed is one of the great concerns of the all of our residents but especially those on 42nd and McKinley. Also people are driving south on 42nd which is a one way going north. Alderman Murphy will request that a speed indicator be placed on 42<sup>nd</sup> Street to allow drivers to see how fast they are really going. The neighbors have shelved the idea of speed bumps at this time due to cost.

There was a discussion about the dumpsters and violations due to companies using them. There is a large fine for the violators. We were reminded of the difficulty that the driver has in positioning the dumpsters if there are cars parked where DPW expected to place the dumpsters.

The monthly neighborhood walk with Captain Harpole, Alderman Murphy takes place on the third Monday, of the month beginning at 43rd and Vliet at 6:15pm Grant discussion resulted in the following commitments. Volunteers for the Steering Committee are Pat M., Sharon W, Linda and Pat D, Amy P, Al S, Karen S, Sandy W, and Maggie B. Light Brigade volunteers are George, Eileen and Betty on 42nd St, Highland and Vliet; Pat M. on 43rd St., Linda and Pat on 44th. We still need volunteers for 43rd, 44th north of Juneau. 45th and 46th north and south of Juneau. Lois and Sandy on 45th Street will coordinate the upper block party. Tandria will volunteer to work on the Neighborhood Cohesiveness goal focusing on youth activities. <>
