Cold Spring Barns - A Brief History Lesson by George Drury

This history is about the very large building that is across Highland Boulevard from Birdie's Café. Take a good look at the building from the bridge and you will see large two story garage doors and electric tracks leading to the building. By 1907, TM (The Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light Co.) had outgrown its shop facilities, and the company began planning a new, larger headquarters for the Rolling Stock Department. TM acquired 10 acres at 40th Street and Cold Spring (McKinley) Avenue, pretty much at the center of TM's network of car lines. Planning, engineering, and construction took four years. In 1911, TM moved in and proceeded to rebuild or build much of its own rolling stock.

The new buildings, which occupied about four acres, had about 250,000 square feet of floor space. There were two groups of buildings separated by a transfer table (basically a turntable that moves sideways). West of the transfer table were the forge, steel, motor, electrical, and machine shops. To the east were the paint, erecting, and woodworking shops, the drafting rooms, and the engineering office in earlier years. At the north end of the transfer table along Cold Spring Avenue was the administration building, which connected the two groups of buildings; beneath it was a tunnel for streetcars. West of Highland Boulevard on land now used by Miller Brewing for pallet and keg storage were a power plant, several storage sheds, and a track connection to the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad. In 1928, The Milwaukee Road added "Pacific" to its name.

In the 1950s Cold Spring Shops was grossly underutilized and company management sought outside work. In late 1955, that consisted of building golf carts.

The Milwaukee County Historical Society constructed and maintains a transit history exhibit on the second floor of the MCTS downtown transit center. The exhibit follows Milwaukee's transit history from horse cars to modern buses, but it is one of Milwaukee's best-kept secrets, as hardly anyone uses the transit center, and even fewer know there is an exhibit on the second floor. <>

The Thao Family is at the Market!

There is not a day of rest from the marketplace for the neighborhood Thao family (mom, dad, two daughters) who sell vegetables, herbs, and flowers at our Vliet Street Sunday Market. Beginning in June with lettuce and greens, mellowing through July and August with eggplant, tomatoes, beans, and onions, the bountiful variety includes beautiful flowers.

At the September 12 Dog Day market, I had the opportunity to observe a daughter explain the fine tuning of preparing patty pan squash to customers who then left with the squash, eggplant, onions and a recipe for dinner! Another customer embraced one of the colorful bouquets, commenting that she had to have her weekly flowers. I have been particularly graced with a warm welcome and rich juicy tomatoes.

The connection of neighbors and the Sunday market is part of this Hmong family's story. Immigrating from Thailand, both parents had limited English but extensive agricultural expertise. In their native country it is customary for young people to be sent away from the family to stake our land and begin growing crops. These agricultural skills are now the mainstay for the family. Land was rented in the Mequon area and developed into the growing plot that produces vegetables and flowers. The regular post for the family business during the work week for the past ten plus years is the Fondy Market at North and Fond du Lac Avenues. When Vliet Street Sunday Market opened, the Thaos added Sunday to their schedule. Often it is the younger generation staffing the stall. When I asked a daughter if this meant her parents had a day of rest, she smiled and let me know that her folks were, as they are most days of the week, tending to the land and crops.

Don't miss the Thao family booth at the Vliet Street Sunday Market which continues until Oct. 10th.<>

Report on Community Networking By: Raymond Duncan

There are some good things to share that I learned from the last Community Networking Meeting at the District 3 Police Station.

There were sixteen burglaries in our neighborhood in 2009, and nine so far this year; no real percentage increase. The numbers from this year include a recent burglary with no forced entry. We are experiencing a lower crime rate than other nearby areas which have had up to a 26% increase. The Police Captain explained that the increase occurred after the networks switched to HDTV and many people purchased new TVs. And the bad economy doesn't help the situation.

Shirley Drake, Eric Pennebaker, Pat Mueller and I attended the Community Networking meetings regularly and our participation is much greater than nearby neighborhoods with more residents than we have. You are welcome to join us for this monthly meeting on the last Thursday of the month (which changes in November and December because of the holidays). I feel you are safer because of this participation.

The Milwaukee Police Department has many items which cannot be returned to the rightful owner because there is no identification. I suggest you use a cell phone camera to take a picture of the serial numbers on the back of your electronics and then e-mail the pictures to yourself for safe storage. New Meeting Schedule By Raymond Duncan



Martin Drive Community Garden By: Steve Falsetti

For years the green space at the intersection of 46th Street and Vliet sat vacant and unused. In the fall of 2008 a group of neighbors united to clean up and land-scape the area. At this time, a unique landmark, created by children and an artist from the neighborhood, was installed at the location.

The Martin Drive Community Garden was established in the spring of 2009 when a new resident with a green thumb presented the idea during a neighborhood meeting. Shortly thereafter a group of neighbors and friends converged at the green space and built six raised flower/vegetable beds. After the garden was created, residents of the Martin Drive Neighborhood began to hang out, relax, and use the formerly vacant green space.

Originally, finding a water source was a concern, but we were able to obtain a permit for a hydrant near our garden. Initially we had to carry buckets to water the garden, but recently a number of hoses were donated, which has helped immensely with watering. With talk of the City eliminating hydrant permits next year, we are concerned about a water source.

The garden initiative has spurred a number of other creative neighborhood projects. There are five Aldo Leopold benches at the garden, which were decorated by five different Martin Drive residents. There are also plans to paint a large chessboard and hopscotch on a vacant driveway at the garden location. Additionally, the neighborhood association has held the annual Martin Drive Summer Sizzle Picnic at the green space for the past two years.

This year the garden expanded – two new vegetable beds were added and the area along the fence line has slowly been landscaped. The project has connected neighbors and created opportunities for young residents to learn about and taste a cornucopia of fresh fruits and vegetables. It has also established a pretty, peaceful meeting place in the Martin Drive Neighborhood.
