

During my years in seminary, Tamara and I would take turns visiting our families during the holidays. We would alternate Thanksgiving and Christmas each year between the two families. On one particular visit we were to fly back to Chicago Midway from Denver International Airport with enough time to return home and get ready to attend a wedding of two seminary classmates of mine. That was the plan, anyway. Our flight had a small delay. Then, a larger delay was announced. Soon, you guessed it, departure was delayed yet again. It became apparent that we would not even be able to be on the ground in Chicago—much less at the wedding—before the ceremony began. The plans that looked so good all week changed before our very eyes. We didn't have a choice. In the moment it was hard to feel positive.

This "Word from the Pastor" is not the one I had intended to write. I had planned to write about the hope and glory of resurrection. I was going to

write about how the Easter message gives us hope because no matter our present suffering or evil that confronts us or the difficulties and stresses of live, God's grace will triumph in the end. I wanted to emphasize what I had shared in last week's sermon that, as Fredrick Buechner wrote, the worst thing is never the last thing. This is the reality of resurrection. I was going to point out all we have experienced as a congregation over the past 1½ years (fire, flood, illness, death, urgent building repairs and changing demographics and ministries...) and how following each challenge there have been signs of resurrection. Hope has always emerged. God's Spirit is experienced anew. Blessings, both familiar and unexpected, have been abundant. However, the coronavirus has changed so much about life. Little about Lent, Easter or life seems normal or within our control. We won't be able to worship in person on Easter or Holy Week. Most spring events we usually look forward to will not take place this year. We don't even know how long this all will last.

Except, of course, life in the shadow of the COVID-19 disease is but the latest challenge we have faced. From a biblical point of view, I have often experienced that Easter loses much of its power if we don't honestly deal with the events between Jesus' entry to Jerusalem and his death. Most of us, naturally, don't like to confront issues of mortality, suffering and injustice. Now, however, the novel coronavirus means we can't escape such considerations. Most of us will suffer some combination of physical, social, emotional, spiritual and financial distress. For some, these effects will be severe. Yet, even when we "walk through the valley of the shadow of death," the psalmist says we have nothing to fear because God is with us, protecting and comforting us, even preparing a feast amidst our crises. We know the virus in circulation is not God's will, but rather part of the way nature can run its course. Clearly, then, faith isn't causal of disaster and struggle. Neither is ingenuity or technical skill preventative. We depend on God for the abundant life. Easter reminds us God ultimately prevails, even when God's son was tortured and killed—because of resurrection. Don't be afraid to walk through the present dark valley in the present or to encounter the scriptures of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. For in the suffering of Jesus and those close to him, we can see reflections of the sin and suffering in our lives. And, we can see how the resurrection on Easter can powerfully animate our lives. So, live like Easter people and God's grace will multiply! We will get through this...we have already overcome crises several times!

"Growing in Faith" Capital Campaign Account (previously known as "Capital Account Seed Money"):


As we begin to receive the Growing in Faith (GIF) donations, we will report the balance in the account each month. As of March 26th, the account has a balance of \$75,978.65 (of that amount, the "furnace replacement donations" total \$32,828.00. All donations made for the "Furnace Replacement" will be held in this account until needed.) In March, we paid contractors the balance owed on the electrical upgrades and the new bathroom. The Trustees also received an insurance check and reimbursed the GIF Capital Campaign account for expenses paid from that account.

Caribou Ecumenical Food Pantry – The CEFP is implementing a plan we hope will allow the pantry to keep open on a no or limited contact basis for the duration of this crisis as food insecurity appears to be growing in our area. If you can offer yourself for packing boxes or assisting at the pantry in some fashion, contact Ruthann Weeks.

Bobbi Pelletier is available by phone and email for church business during her usual hours, M-F from 9-noon. The Gray Memorial building remains closed until further notice. We are asking that people NOT come to the church in-person unless you have an essential item to be picked up or dropped off that can't be handled in any other way. Tithes and offerings should be contributed using one of the methods outlined on the next page. This procedure is meant to protect the health of our remaining staff who use the building and the people with whom they live or with whom they have contact. Thank you for your understanding. Rev. Tim is available for appointments by phone and video conference. Mondays continue to be his usual day off. Contact him by phone or email to arrange a time.

** Worship services at the church building and in-person events remain suspended until further notice. As of this writing, these suspensions will at a minimum continue through Sunday, April 26. We urge people to heed the recommendations and directives of local, state and CDC officials due to the large numbers of people at elevated and high risk during this COVID-19 outbreak. The church, that is the people of God, is not closed. Even though we will be conducting ministries in ways that are different than what is familiar, it is no less ministry.

- By EFT (Electronic Funds Transfer) via VANCO--several people have already chosen this method for recurring gifts. If you are interested in this method, please contact Tamara Wilcox, 492-0371, to set up an EFT.
- By GiftPlus, a mobile application, also offered by VANCO. You can download GiftPlus from the Apple App Store or from Google Play. This method supports both recurring and one-time gifts.

All VANCO methods include a nominal service fee for the church. Many people choose the options provided by VANCO for convenience and, for the electronic options, to ensure their gifts are always regularly given. Because of regular giving, research shows churches receive more funds overall using these methods. Contact Tamara Wilcox for more information on giving options.
