A few days after the Solar Eclipse, a church friend posted this drone photo on Facebook. Funny thing about aerial drone photos - they show a different perspective than what we're used to seeing. We begin to see where we are situated, who and what surrounds us, and our curiosity is peaked.

The original of this photograph was rather dark.

You couldn't really see much detail beyond the church, so I used Photoshop to change its exposure settings. That shed a light beyond the church itself and onto the surrounding landscape. Almost immediately, a feeling of gratitude and clarity flooded over me. Two words came to mind: "Oasis" and "Sanctuary".

Spiritually, an "Oasis" is wherever God is. A place where you can find the love, forgiveness, and grace of God, right in the middle of a desert or wilderness. It's a flourishing place full of life. A "Sanctuary" is a holy place, set apart from the profane and the ordinary world. It's a place where the divine and sacred are believed to be especially present. Even a natural outdoor setting can be a sanctuary, where one finds peace and safe harbor.

The challenges we face today lie in the disparity of our call to help "the least of these", and our struggle to preserve Gray Memorial as a "Sanctuary Oasis". A holy place where, anyone in our community can come to find peace, and Communion with God. Not only are we at our city's physical crossroads; we're at the spiritual crossroads of hurting communities, faith communities, and transformation.

We're blessed to have spirited believers, a spectacular sanctuary, and a prime location. Let's use those strengths to be a hub for connecting the hurting people of God with the love of Christ - the cornerstones of which are worship, prayer, and outreach.

Within this next month, you'll find an intentional focus on prayer and anointing. Prayer boxes are going to be installed in the Memorial Garden, under our church's new portico, in our fellowship hall downstairs, and on beautiful prayer tables as you enter the sanctuary. Prayer sheets will be in every pew and be included in our visitor packets. Please let Pastor Rich know if you want to be part of the "Prayer Team" who'll pray over each confidential prayer. Starting Sunday, May19, every third Sunday worship will offer an anointing with healing oil.

Pentecost is May 19. May the Holy Spirit fill you to overflowing! God bless you.

"<u>Growing in Faith" Capital Campaign Account</u>: The Capital Campaign officially ended December 31, 2022. Any donations marked for this Capital Campaign are automatically recorded as donations to the Operating Budget. Balance reported in last month's Newsletter was \$35,573.38. Since then, we received interest of \$2.05 and donations for the "Emergency Fund" for \$19,515.97! We made our first payment of \$638.06 for the \$90,000 loan, which leaves us with a balance of \$54,453.34 in the account (of that amount, the "furnace replacement donation funds" that remain are \$5,424.27).

Is your household or someone you know experiencing food insecurity? The Caribou Ecumenical Food Pantry serves the communities of Caribou, Connor, Woodland, Wade, Washburn and Perham and will provide food to those households that meet income guidelines. The Pantry, located at 31 Herschel Street in Caribou, is open on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 8am to 11am. Please call 493-4860 between those hours and the pantry volunteers will help provide you with food boxes (available every 4 weeks or as needed). Gray Memorial UMC has an account at the Bennett Drive Redemption Center. When you bring your bottles/cans to the center, you may designate the proceeds to go the church's account! If you are not comfortable bringing them yourselves, you may bring them to the church and we will take them to the Redemption Center.

We received \$23.50 in April donations, so our proceeds are now \$1,032.35! Thank you for your support of this project! Just a reminder that these monies are used to cover operating expenses.

In praise of church musicians

Great leaders of congregational song attend to the new community formed every time a church gathers.

Individuals who impact us in untold ways inadvertently get overlooked. Some of the unsung heroes who've helped make me who I am are church musicians. Worship organizes my life and centers my soul in ways that you can only know by knowing me. But the music of worship is what has helped generate the particular kind of person I am.

Gifted church musicians know how to help people sing together. They're genius at helping a congregation get "lost in wonder, love, and praise," to borrow Charles Wesley's words, without simply getting lost. Week in and week out, these practitioners enlarge individual worlds, send chills up spines, and remind worshipers that singing is not an external option for our lives; it's an internal component of being fully human. This column is for all those who help congregations make music on a weekly basis but who might not often hear how much their work matters to those around them.

Every time a congregation gathers, a new community must form. Even if the assembly just met the previous week, its character has altered.

Various component parts have shifted. Bodies have aged, however slightly. New joys have walked in the door. Fresh sorrows have settled into a back pew. Two tenors from the choir are missing. An elder has died. A baby gets happily passed around. A funny bulletin typo has people whispering. One of the spotlights above the pulpit is flickering annoyingly.

It's the musicians who must pay attention to all of the nuances of this new community. They have the job of listening closely to everything that's going on. They must assume responsibility for helping the boundaries and distinctions of this diverse group of people relax enough to become fresh solidarity. This is hard work that requires no small degree of faith, skill, and humility. But if it's successful, a bonding of people will occur. A thickness of congregational spirit will emerge. A weight of mystery will fill up the interior dimensions of peoples' lives. Those who thought they couldn't sing, or who don't want to sing, suddenly find themselves enveloped in lovely ways by the resonant voice of the church singing together.

Excellent church musicians-whether they play piano, lean into an organ, lead a band, compose music, or direct a choir-are theologians in their own right. They're people convinced that the glory of God is central to honest worship and not just some Jesus-y feelings that can well up inside the bellies of hungry worshipers. They're busy fighting for the congregation to find its voice, yearning for each and every soul to discover that singing is sacred duty. Church musicians who have given the greatest shape to my life are those who appear to delight more in getting music into my soul than just out of theirs. Yes, the talent of their hands, feet, and vocal cords may be awesome, which is beautiful. But the way they deploy their abilities determines whether the rest of us feel bigger or smaller than when we arrived.

Eugene Peterson suggests that song is the result of excess energy. "When we are normal, we talk," says Peterson. "When we are dying, we whisper. But when there is more in us than we can contain, we sing." The next time you find yourself in worship experiencing more joy than you can hold inside yourself, sing like your life depends on it. And then, flag down your music leader on your way out the door to let them know of your gratitude. \Box

Church Council Minutes April 18, 2024

Members present: Roy Alden (chair), Debbie Barnes, Bobbi Pelletier, Shirley Bowman, Melonie Carlson, Judi Greenier, Diane Fitzpatrick (pretend secretary)

The meeting was opened at 1:00p.m. by Roy, who offered an opening prayer.

Open Discussion:

- Roy began by talking about a church in the Washington D.C. area that he and Beth visited recently. They were both very impressed with the open and friendly reception they received! They discovered that it was a Black church and everyone made them feel so welcomed. At this church, there is a coffee and donut time in the narthex before the service begins. They found the people very eager to include them and extended warm hospitality. Roy then posed two questions:
 - 1. Are we as open and welcoming?
 - 2. Could we do better?
- Pastor Rich was unable to attend the meeting due to other commitments. He asked Roy to present the following for discussion:
 - 1. Using Roy's example, we could possibly modify the library slightly to allow for a "refreshment bar" of sorts, so we could offer light sweets, coffee, and tea before worship and, on a specific schedule, offer coffee hour also. Most of the people who do not go downstairs for coffee after the service would more readily stay upstairs for fellowship. This would have to be a "program" with an intentional goal.
 - 2. The Trustees will host a Church Grounds Clean-Up and BBQ following the UMM breakfast and program on April 27, from 10am to 1:30pm. Everyone is invited to participate. A handout will be included in the bulletin this Sunday.
 - 3. On June 1, the Conference will host a Zoom Pre-Conference meeting. This is an important gathering when local church leaders and pastors will hear what went on at the late April General Conference. We will hear what info will be brought to Annual Conference to be voted on. Pastor Rich's plan is to have the Zoom meeting streaming to our sanctuary sound/video system for our members to come and go. Pastor Rich and Cheryl Martin, our Lay Member to Annual Conference, will be present with their laptops so we can be "present" with our DS, Rick McKinley. The same scenario will take place during our Annual Conference on June 21 to 23. Pastor Rich and Cheryl will have to vote via Zoom. YouTube will livestream the entire conference.
 - 4. Once the Memorial Garden and church area are cleaned, a locked prayer box with prayer sheets will be mounted at the garden edge of the parking lot, under the portico area of the church, in our sanctuary, and two in the fellowship hall. This will be followed by the development of a prayer team who will review the prayer requests with the pastor and help organize prayer meetings (worship).
- Bobbi mentioned re-energizing the greeter program. The NOW team is in hopes of getting this going once again. The team is also working on a visitor packet.

• Roy asked about Pastor Rich greeting people before the service begins. Bobbi explained that he will continue doing that but will be in the pulpit at 9:55 to ask that everyone be in the spirit of prayer before the prelude begins. Our organist/pianists put a lot of time into preparing a nice prelude and we can show our appreciation by being silent. It was suggested by Bobbi that perhaps Melonie might have people assigned to various sections of the church to greet people as they are seated. Roy mentioned that everything hinges on structure. Perhaps we might rethink the order or structure of "things".

Financial Statements:

- Bobbi distributed copies of the financial statements which she and Shirley addressed. Bobbi reported that when memorial monies are received, she asks the families where they would like the money to be designated.
- Bobbi reported that the Security Team is looking at having to pay \$3,300.00 to purchase a new entry door into the narthex. She also mentioned the need for the Security Team to be more transparent in letting us know who they are, what they have done, and what they want to do. Roy suggested that Judi Greenier and Pastor Rich could obtain more information from Jud. Judi reported that Jud has resigned from the Board of Trustees but will continue as custodian. He will be encouraged to continue to report to the Trustees as to what the needs of the church are.

Review and Highlights of Committee Reports:

- Melonie reported that the NOW Team logo is now on the Wellness/Recreation Center brochures. Lots of new activities are being planned. The NOW Team will host a Spring Fling in May with a garden theme.
- Bobbi reported that the Worship committee has purchased new offering plates which are now in use. They are much lighter in weight than the old ones!
- Roy reported that the UMM will have a breakfast and meeting on April 27. Charles Thomas will be present to speak on maple syrup business. He also encouraged everyone to help out that day on the church yard cleanup. It would be nice to invite others to join us and stay to enjoy the BBQ.
- Debbie mentioned that the SPRC has not met so there is no report at this time.

New Business:

- Roy said that nothing new has been received except for the need for the Security Team to give us a clear picture of what they are doing so that the Church Council and the entire church congregation is aware of their purpose and plans. Roy asked that the Security Team submit a report to the Church Council as well as the Trustees so that it can be shared with the congregation.
- Bobbi asked if the nominating committee has met to get committees in place for the next year. It was mentioned that the church calendar may be changed to a January to December format instead of July to June.
- Bobbi expressed concern about going to a One Board program which would include Trustees, Finance, SPRC, and Church Council. What would become of other committees such as Worship, Education, NOW (evangelism/missions). How would we transition to a One Board?
- Melonie mentioned a Safer Sanctuary Training Session that is in the planning for clergy and laity. Pastor Rich may have more information on this.
- Bobbi recommended that the Church Council recognize Claire Hodgkins for her many years of service as their secretary with a certificate during a church service. All agreed.

Judson opened the meeting with a prayer.

Secretary's report: No report.

Treasurer's report:

The Archie Belyea memorial account of \$6,165.97 was liquidated. A motion was made by Dave, seconded by Judson and passed that the money be put into the Emergency Fund as requested by a family member.

Scholarships. The scholarships (Brown, Budd, and Lancaster) will not be paid out for 2023 as George Ferland is no longer in school.

Income and payouts. Judi distributed a list of local accounts and check book additions and payouts. As of March 19, 2024, there is \$6,830.56 in the trustee checkbook. A motion was made by Dave, seconded by Debbie and passed that the treasurer's report be accepted.

OLD BUSINESS

Lighting in church basement. As voted by phone on February 28, 2024, all lights in the basement have been replaced by LED lighting through funding from Efficiency Maine Trust. The work was completed Friday, April 5th. Efficiency Maine paid \$7,280.99. The trustees paid \$1,820.99 for labor and a dimmer switch on lights in choir room. There are ten former lights with LED bulbs from the choir room available to the congregation. Suggested donation is \$20. The electric bill will be favorably affected by this project. A solar panel in the upper parking lot would eliminate the electric bill.

Safety Committee. This subcommittee of the trustees has met again and watched training videos. They have purchased traffic cones at a bargain price of \$5 each to be used outside. There was much discussion on the parking and a plan for handicapped parking, keeping in mind to leave a path for a fire lane. George Knorr had outside watch last Sunday. People have been searching the cars parked around the church. Cars, other than parishioners are not allowed to park in the upper parking lot during the week. Some have been towed. There was also much discussion about safety inside the church. It is the safety committee's job also to keep the church quiet during the service.

NEW BUSINESS

Lawn care for 2024. The lawn tractor needs \$140 worth of repairs. Judson will tune it up. Roy Alden took care of the lawns last summer as a volunteer. Judson also has been the

volunteer lawn caretaker. We cannot hire persons who are not members of the church as our insurance does not cover them. Professional landscapers do have their own insurance. We have paid \$1700 in the past. The issue was tabled.

Ceiling in sanctuary. There are creosote stains on the ceiling. Painting it requires staging, moving the pews and having church services in the basement for several weeks. If Judson uses his staging and helps Justin and the job is done before May, Beeline Painting will do this for \$7000. Wendy noted that the ceiling had just been painted after the last sprinkler problem in 2019. This project is tabled until we can find out how much insurance will pay in totality for the January 11th sprinkler waterfall. Fred C. Church Insurance has been very slow – a month until an adjuster arrived – and has asked again for thirty more days.

Front doors. Push bars were planned for the front doors (for safety's sake), but the present doors are not up to code. They need to be replaced and then the safety push bars attached.

Judson is resigning as trustee chairman. Dean attended our meeting as Judson's liaison from SPRC. Pastor Rich talked about the miscommunication between the two committees and the congregation. Suggested that Del talk about the trustees decisions during church on occasion. Suggested that liaisons attend meetings of their charges (as Dean was doing). There was much discussion of having a church maintenance person, combining the custodian work with the work that Judson has been doing overseeing the church maintenance on his own time (using his experience as a contractor and knowledge of fire safety code). Because of the age of the church – one hundred and eleven years (111) old, a maintenance person is needed.

Briefly Pastor Rich noted that a one-board system for the church is under discussion with district superintendent Rick McKinley.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Pastor Rich.
