Anna Roberts is turning 108 on July 5, 2025! In honor of this milestone, I thought it would be nice for all of you to read the following piece:

Anna Roberts (interview by Margaret Kimball, maybe done in 2015):

A pleasant smile on Anna's face greeted me upon entering the room where she sat. Dressed for the day, she was ready to meet it with enthusiasm. One might think that is impossible at 103, but Anna is not an ordinary woman. As I take a chair near-by, Anna checks her e-mail for messages on her Kindle. When this technology came on the market, she stated, "I didn't want to be left behind. It is a great way to keep in touch with people who live away or in surrounding areas. Comparing it to the manual typewriter in my high school classes, this is exciting to use."

Anna grew up on the family farm with her brother, five years her senior, on the East Presque Isle Road and parents Silas and Mercy Spooner. When it was time to attend school, she rode the school wagon drawn by horses, to the one room schoolhouse in Greenridge, a small hamlet about one mile from the farm. This trek continued for seven grades of her learning. The eighth grade and high school years she came into the town of Caribou and stayed with her Uncle Jerry and Aunt Mabel Smith who lived on High Street and had a daughter named Barbara. Though Barbara was three years younger, they became fast friends in the company of each other.

Compared to the country farm, the Smith house was luxury living with indoor plumbing, electricity, central heating, and a baby grand piano that sat in the parlor. Though the piano added status to the room's appearance, Barbara and Anna were the only two who tinkled the ivories.

Entering the eighth grade found Anna struggling in her studies; they were so different, so advanced in the school system, with changing rooms and teachers with every subject, and not knowing any students. Though it was a challenge Anna was determined to learn and she did.

In 1993, at the age of fifteen, Anna received her diploma. What an accomplishment! Her first job was working for an attorney, Mr. Hall in Caribou. But this position lasted only a brief time. An opening at an agricultural office in Presque Isle found her traveling the distance of thirteen miles with Floris Gee, who was employed in that town.

A short time later, she received a phone call from Nora Raymond, an acquaintance, asking if she would be interested in a job at the Caribou Town Office?

Anna applied and was hired. She was employed for the next forty-five years as Caribou's bookkeeper and deputy tax collector.

Because the other employees seemed much more experienced, perhaps because he was much younger, Anna felt she would have to prove herself to be capable of her position in being dependable, efficient, with a pleasing personality.

In the ensuing weeks and months, Anna learned to fit in with her co-workers and the job ran smoothly.

The decade of the thirties were depression years at its worst.

At the office Anna saw farmers, business owners and homeowners struggling to pay their property taxes. Many were losing their homes and farms because of no jobs, and no money. It was a time of hardship when the head of households put aside pride, came to town offices and asked for a town order with a money value to purchase food at a local grocery store to feed their families. Other times it would be for wood from the town's stockpile.

Anna continued to live with her Uncle Jerry and Aunt Mabel during the workweek, but returned to the family farm by way of horse and buggy on the weekends.

When cousin Barbara entered high school, Barbara's friends became Anna's friends and together their lives were filled with activities and young men's requests for dates.

Ginn's Pavilion and Paul's Arena were two popular dance clubs frequented by young couples and were located between Fort Fairfield and Presque Isle. On Saturday night, the dance floor would be crowded with couple dancing to the latest hits played by local bands. At Ginn's Pavilion, the large colored light dome about the dance floor circled the swaying couples to the music and gave a romantic touch to the evening.

Picnics on Sunday with friends at near-by lakes were favorite outings. And when the annual county fair came to Presque Isle in early autumn, it was a special event for folks to attend. Anna and Barbara were among the young folks having a grand time riding the Ferris wheel, the bullet and swings. The amusement area was full of laughter and noise, memories being made to recall in later years.

The movie theater was another venue of entertainment for couples. Caribou had two, the Powers Theater and the Rudy Theater which had a balcony. For twenty-five cents, a person could enter the world of drama, comedy, or romance. At the Powers Theater, burgundy velvet drapes opened up to a large screen, and from the projection room above the seated audience, the screen came alive with sound and pictures. For many in attendance, it was a way to forget the worries and the troubles they would encounter upon leaving the theater.

In the mid-thirties, with President Roosevelt's New Deal passed by Congress, funds were allotted to states towns, and cities for infrastructure. Caribou was a recipient of the project, called WPA. It put men to work building bridges, roads, updating utility facilities, installing street lights and laying sidewalks, giving the town some state of prominence. Folks were encouraged that the economy was on an upswing. They had money to spend, and cash registers of businesses were ringing again.

The town office, once located on Sweden Street in the early years of Anna's employment, was moved to High Street, a short distance from where Anna lived, which made going home for lunch convenient. Each work day rain, shine, or snow, she walked the tree-lined street, passing attractive clapboard houses and thinking she would one day have her own house.

In the fall of 1936, Barbara went off to college in Massachusetts. Anna missed her as she had been the catalyst in bringing Anna to bloom to enjoy life at its best.

It was at this time that Anna and eight or ten other young single girls formed a group known as "The Gala Gang". Their night on the town was to be together, to enjoy the evening of dancing, dining out, attending parties and local events. The girls were out for fun and laughter, a fling before becoming serious of what the future held, marriage, home, children; memories they would recall in later years.

From the circle of friends Anna had made, a young man named Prescott Roberts began to date her. She found him kind in nature, polite, and witty; qualities Anna liked. They were friends in the beginning of their dating, just friends before becoming a steady couple.

With the early forties rumblings of war in Europe came to the forefront and the question on everyone's mind was, "Would the US become involved?"

On December 7, 1941 an attack on Pearl Harbor by Japan nearly crippled the entire US navy fleet that was docked there. The attack was broadcast over the airways and the American people were stunned by such a bold strike. Within hours Congress convened and President Roosevelt announced to the nation that we were at war with Japan.

Meanwhile, Germany had invaded and conquered Poland, France, Czechoslovakia and was determined to conquer Europe. An urgent plead came from Winston Churchill to President Roosevelt for help, a plead Roosevelt realized had to be met. The United State would now find itself at war on two battle fronts, one in the South Pacific and the other in Europe.

For the next four years the American people would become united on the home front. All across the US, factories converted to the war effort and operated around the clock supplying planes, tanks, guns, and ammunition needed by the military.

Church Council Minutes June 19, 2025

Members Present: Roy Alden (chair), Bobbi Pelletier, Pastor Rich Rego, Debbie Barnes, Mary Lou Brown, Diane Fitzpatrick, Shirley Bowman, Melonie Carlson, Judi Greenier

The meeting was opened at 1:00pm with a prayer offered by Pastor Rich Rego.

Open Discussion Question: How do we recognize God's role in our lives when we face times of changes in our lives that cause stress and anxiety? Many members present indicated that they pray to ask God for guidance, peace, and comfort.

Financial Statements:

- Shirley reported that the total amount received during the month of May in offerings was \$11,102.58. With the addition of special funds received, the ending total was \$11,878.38.
- Bobbi reported on expenses versus donations. We began the month of May with a negative balance of \$1,078.20 and ended the month with a negative balance of \$6,007.85. Two months of Mission Shares were paid in March, but we will hold off on paying any more until our bills have been paid. Mission Shares amount to \$2,387.33 a month.
- Roy expressed concern that we will come to the point where we will have to cut our budget or expect more giving from the membership.
- Pastor Rich proposed that with the cost of oil and propane going up, the Trustees may consider supplementing oil with solar panels. Another suggestion was that we coordinate the meeting times of the various committees so that the church would be open fewer days of the week, thus reducing the need for heat and lights during the week. Pastor Rich also suggested that Pastor Ben may be agreeable to holding some meetings at the parsonage.
- Bobbi stated that she will be meeting with Spectrum to see about lowering our bill.

Other Business:

- Pastor Rich complimented the Transition Team on a lovely reception held on June 14th for Karen and him.
- Melonie reported that the Cluster is proposing a one-day Vacation Bible School on Saturday, August 16th. Time and place are yet to be determined.
- Bobbi suggested that perhaps we could hold our own VBS next summer.
- Gwen and Aurora Barnum will be attending Camp Mechuwana during separate weeks this summer.
- Judi reported on the sound booth demonstration that Will and Alaina held following the worship service on June 15th. She said that Jud did a good job constructing the sound booth and that Will and Alaina are doing a fantastic job with the sound system and work so well together! She also thanked Roy for his technical abilities in filling in at the booth. Judi mentioned that Dave Belyea may be

- willing to be trained on the workings of the system! Pastor Rich then mentioned that Jeremy may be interested in helping out.
- Judi reported that she and Mary Lou have been "exercising" the organ to keep it in good working condition. They hope that others in the congregation may be willing to help as well.
- Bobbi has the pianist schedules completed for this month and is still working with Bella Albert on playing occasionally during the summer months. Mari-Jo Hedman is willing to help out beginning in the fall.
- Melonie displayed a print of the parsonage that is a copy of the one Sandy Pethick made for Pastor Rich and Karen as a going away gift from the NOW Team. She said that the print is also on a disk so that other copies can be made. Mary Lou offered to have this one matted and framed so that it can be displayed in the church library.
- Mary Lou displayed a laminated placemat of our church's timeline from 1913 until 2013 and asked if there is a need for copies to be made. Everyone agreed that it would be nice to have more copies. The original timeline will be updated.

Pastor Rich reported on the following:

- The Security Team needs to be reporting to the Trustees so that we can receive a report on a monthly basis.
- There is a need for signage on how to deal with emergencies. Multiple signs should be posted throughout the church, both upstairs and downstairs.
- An issue on who is to close the swinging doors into the sanctuary when the service begins is ongoing. Communication is needed from the Security Team.

The next meeting will be held on Thursday, July 17th at 1:00. Roy suggested that we have some refreshments available to share as we hold a more informal meeting to welcome Pastor Ben.
