Legislative Issues

A couple weeks ago I was invited to attend a 2018 Farm Bill Specialty Crop Forum hosted by the staff of U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow. At this forum, I learned that there were no funds removed from the base line of the Farm Bill from the previous version. Also, Michigan is now ranked 4th in the country in production of Hops. Michigan has always been a diverse production state; however, I was unaware of the commercial production of hops.

In a few short hours from the time of me writing this article. I will be boarding a plane and heading to Washington DC to join many other Grangers during the National Grange Legislative Fly-In to discuss topics of current importance on Capitol Hill. While I currently have a confirmed meeting set up with Congressman John Moolenaar, I am planning to stop by Senator Stabenow's office and Senator Peters' office in hopes they will be able to meet with me. We will be discussing the Grange's position on topics such as Healthcare, Agriculture, and telecommunications.

As I am sure you are all aware by now, we have our State Grange Convention coming up in October. What you may not know is that we have changed the dates from our usual dates to the next week due to facility availability. Mark on your calendar the new dates which will be October 24, 25, 26, 2019. Is Tinnitus Causing That Ringing in Your Ears?

(I found this in the Grand Rapids Press on Sunday, April 14)

Have you ever found a constant ringing in your ears that you can't pinpoint the cause? It might be tinnitusthe sensation of hearing a sound when no external sound is present.

In some cases, tinnitus can be managed but for some, it's a chronic condition that can affect sleep and everyday function. Fortunately there are options to reduce its effects.

About 1 in 5 people experience the perception of noise or ringing in the ears. It's call tinnitus.

Dr. Gayla Poling is the director of Diagnostic Audiology at Mayo Clinic. She says tinnitus can be perceived a myriad of ways: ringing, buzzing, whistling, a crackling, a chirping.

According to the Mayo Clinic website "the phantom noise may vary in pitch from a low roar to a high squeal, and you may hear it in one or both ears, in some cases, the sound can be so loud it can interfere with the ability to concentrate or hear external sound. Tinnitus may be present all the time or it may come and go.

But why?

"Ninety percent of those with tinnitus have having loss, so that's usually where we start as a source or a reason for the tinnitus."

Hearing loss can be age related, some from a one-time exposure, or exposure to loud sounds over a lifetime. Poling says the tiny hairs in our inner ear may play a role.

Those little hair cells in our inner ear are really delicate structures. That's what is actually damaged with noise exposure, or wear and tear on your ears across your lifespan. So those damaged hair cells, might be the reason or part of the cause for tinnitus for some.

Other possible causes include ear problems, chronic health conditions, and injuries or conditions that affect the nerves, either in your ear or in the hearing center of the brain.

Poling says there's no scientifically proven cure for tinnitus, but there are treatment and management options.

That can be something as simple as getting a hearing aid to treating the hearing loss. And once you treat that, then you find that the tinnitus and the perception of that tinnitus is reduced.

Other options include using a sound generator or a fan at night. And then there are more advanced treatments.

"There's something called 'tinnitus restraining therapy.' There are more ear level masking devices where you can hear sounds throughout the day, too, that are more distracting."

If ringing in your ears bothers you, start by seeing your health care provider for a hearing test.

HOW TO BE LAZY—AND LOVE IT

It's wonderful to be lazy — if you know how. It spares your heart, saves your energy, relaxes your mind — and you needn't feel at all guilty about it if you confine your laziness to these approved ways, recommended by a psychologist:

- Be too lazy to frown, fidget, and worry.
- Don't wear yourself out carrying the needless weights of grudges, prejudices and envy.
- Listen more than you talk, and see how much better you feel after almost any meeting or gathering.
- Don't run to catch a bus or trolley. The next one is better for your heart.
- Don't rush for a bargain that takes more out of you than it saves for your pocketbook.
- Don't knock yourself out trying to park your car in a space too small for a scooter. Better to pay a parking fee at a lot than a bill at a hospital.
- Don't bother to quarrel over small things—like a card game. Let the other fellow think he's right when it really doesn't matter.

On the evening of March 14th there were four tornados that touched down in Genesee and Shiawassee Counties and left considerable damage to homes, barns, businesses and of course many, many trees. In Shiawassee County alone there were something like 94 places damaged or destroyed. With all this damage there were no serious injuries...everyone is thankful for that. Most places damaged had insurance but there were about 20 that didn't or not enough coverage to help much.

The following night we decided to take the proceeds from our planned jamboree/dinner and match that amount and help those in need. We took ended up with \$645.00. The following day there of our members gathered/purchased \$400. in gift cards for restaurants and \$245.00 worth of groceries. This was all delivered to the Loaves and Fishes in Vernon where the command center had been set up and was distributed to those that needed it.

The next week at our meeting a decision was made to donated the proceeds of our April 7th chicken dinner to those that did not have enough or any insurance. We advertised it to be a benefit with all proceeds going to that fund.
