#### **Banana Splits in Summer**

I found an interesting article on ice cream in one of our local monthlies. It discussed who invented the Banana Split? My mouth is watering as I type this! Apparently, this is disputed by several locations. The Latrobe Pharmacy in Latrobe, Pennsylvania has historical documentation of David Strickler slicing a banana in two, adding scoops of vanilla, chocolate, and strawberry ice cream, three flavored toppings, and whipped cream in 1904. #### **The Notebook Reports**

- Please place the <u>summary report at the beginning</u> of the Notebook. <u>It is required!</u>
- Please do not send more than one Notebook.
   Notebooks cannot be larger than a 2 inch binder
- Videotapes and computer discs cannot be used in place of a report for judging.

#### Organize the Notebooks.

- Tell the your story as you organize your projects
- Group the projects together
- Keep items that support your projects, like thank you letters and newspaper articles, with or without photos.
- Simplify your notebook by selecting the best couple of photos for each project.
- Be concise and stick to the point. More is not always better.

## Ways to Organize

- Organize by New Projects and Continuing Projects
- Or-Organize in chronological order from the beginning to the end of the year
- Or -Organize by the largest projects to the smallest projects
- Keep the page clean and concise
- List all project at the beginning of the book (Index)
- Donations for a project should be noted
- If tabs are use make sure they are secured so they don't fall out
- Remember the notebook maximum size is a 2-inch binder.

Wow it's July!? The first 6 months of 2024 have gone by way too fast! I hope everyone that planted a garden kept in mind the Agriculture Department classes for the 2024 State Session. I really hope to have a good turn out in my Department again this year as there were a wonderful number of entries at the 2023 Session.

We are a few short months now from our 2024 State Session that is being held in Charelvoix. It will be a great time celebrating yet again the 151st of the Michigan State Grange.

Fair season is here again. In just two short months the Berrien County Youth Fair while be coming to a close, as it starts on August 17<sup>th</sup>. This year will be bittersweet at the fair. My niece made the hard decision to not exhibit for her final year at the fair. It means less activities for our family at the fair but also a little more free time as well. Please go support our local youth by attending a Fair near you. There are plenty of things to see besides the amusement rides and fair food if that isn't something you care to do. I remember when I was an exhibitor how it felt to have everyone walk by looking at my animals or still exhibits. It is the youth exhibitors' time to shine for all of their hard work during the summer months (or winter too) leading up to entry day.

Well last year at this time we were having an addition put on to the chicken coop. It was so nice this past winter to have the extra space for all of the hens and the rooster to have. We have had a couple of thunderstorms roll through which is great for the moisture but then the humidity and temperature goes right back up. Remember one class that anyone can enter is the class labeled: Any planting in a Unique container. It can be any type of container, but the planting must have grown in the unique container. Keep in mind that you must be able to transport this item to State Session and be able to bring it from your vehicle with little assistance.
