Also, "his" Dad is currently an award-winning columnist of the Philadelphia Daily News and morning host for 900 WURD Radio in Philadelphia.



December 20, 2014) Solomon and Son interviewed on "Nightline" regarding the civil unrest in Ferguson, MO.

He is also a blogger and frequent on-air commentator for WHYY. "His" Dad began his writing career for the Philadelphia Tribune in 1993 while living at the Ridge Avenue Shelter. He graduated with a B.A. degree in journalism from Temple University in 1997, and went on to be published in Essence, Newsday, the Philadelphia Magazine, and the Philadelphia "My" Dad's first novel, "Pipe Dream," was published in 2001 by Random House and his other novels include "The Bridge," "Ride or Die," "Cream," "Payback," "The Last Confession," and Gravedigger's Ball." His eighth novel, "The Dead Man's Wife" was published in October 2012 by St. Martin's Press. Master Jones went on to say, "My Dad and I have more in common than our names. We both appeared on "Nightline" and we both like football. My Dad is funny and I like his jokes. I also like that he helps me with my homework, encourages me and keeps his promises."

Before hearing a word from on high from Brother Solomon, the Mt. Pisgah's Men's Choir rendered another spirit-filled selection.

Our guest speaker, Brother Solomon E. Jones, II, thanked his son for the wonderful introduction. Brother Jones' prayer request was that he be lifted by the Holy Spirit to infill him with a *Word from on High*. Brother Solomon's topic was the "Story of Moses" and sets the stage. His theme, "Who Am I?"

He began with the scripture from Exodus 3:7-11. Moses was tending the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law's sheep. Moses climbs Mt. Horeb and sees a bush that is on fire but is not consumed by the flames. Moses

is fascinated and goes over to examine this strange sight. The Lord calls him and Moses responds to God's call. Moses is instructed by God to take off his sandals as he is standing on holy ground. God tells Moses that he has heard the plight of his people and is about to give Moses the assignment to lead the people out of bondage. In verse 11, Moses said to God, "Who am I that should go to Pharaoh and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" "Who am I?" Brother Solomon stated we must ask three questions: (1) Who do I say I am? (2) Who does news say that I am? (3) Who does God say that I am?

The story of Moses cannot be defined by Hollywood but in the Bible. Moses lineage goes back to Adam and moves to Exodus 1:2, a son of Israel from the house of Levi. Brother Solomon has captivated the audience (some had eyes closed, some swaying, and some standing). He moves further into Exodus 1:15-16, the Hebrew story of Midwives in how they disobeyed Pharaoh's order to kill infant boys because they feared God more. Moving forth to Exodus 2:1-2, a man marries a Levite woman and gives birth to a boy, Moses. Moses lineage is from the Tribe of Levites. Brother Solomon refers to Genesis 15:13-16. God speaks to Abram who is in a deep sleep and tells him that his descendants will be strangers in a foreign country (Egypt) and will be mistreated for 400 years. Brother Solomon tells us about Moses becoming a man and in Acts 7:25, Moses realizes "Who I am" and that God was using him to rescue the Israelites. However, they did not know "Who does God say that (Moses) I am?"

Brother Solomon has us enraptured and tells us because I AM, YOU ARE. Lay People, we must strive for the future and make no excuses. We experienced a "Wake up with WURD."

After the delivery of this awesome message from Brother Solomon, our pastor, Jay B. Broadnax, gave the invitation for Christian Discipleship. This is a duty Pastor Jay does not take lightly and encourages all that heard the message to become part of the body of Jesus Christ, Jesus Saves.

Brother Gilroy Reid, 1st Vice President of the PCLO and steadfast member of Waters Memorial A.M.E. Church invited persons to become members of the organized Lay. We were blessed that Sisters Jannie Weeks and Christine Patterson accepted the invitation. The Lay Disciples' endeavors were rededicated by Pastor Jay B. Broadnax with a prayer. There were remarks by Sister Shirley Moore-Harris, Brother Gilroy Reid, and our Pastor Jay B. Broadnax. We closed out this portion of our Annual Day with the singing of the Lay Benediction.

A delightful lunch was served consisting of: baked or fried chicken, rice pilaf, potatoes au gratin, green beans, broccoli and baby carrots, rolls, tossed salad, variety of cakes or pies and juice.

Sister Pauline I. Andrews



had a smile that could bring warmth to the down hearted and give a word of encouragement to those in need. Sister Pauline was called home to rest from her labors before the sun shone on early, Tuesday morning, September 29, 2015. Her voice has been stilled by death but "A Lady of Mt. Pisgah's Legacy" will

live on by all that knew her.

Sister Pauline was the youngest child of George and Maude Andrews born February 20, 1925 at Hahnemann Hospital, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Her brother, George, was born one year earlier, February 1, 1924. They lived at 3734 Sansom Street in the 1930s.

Her brother, George, would go on to serve in the United States Army during World War II. His last place of residence was Howard, Maryland. He died January 12, 2001 and is buried at Garrison Forest Veterans Cemetery, Ownings Mills, Maryland, leaving his sister, Pauline, as the last known surviving member of the immediate Andrews family.

Sister **Pauline** graduated from West Philadelphia High School around 1943 and joined the "Legacy" of another Mt. Pisgahan, Dr. Ruth Wright Hayre, as an alumna of the "Blue and Orange." Even after 70 some years as a graduate of her alma mater, she could still sing three verses of her school song. Sister Pauline strove for excellence in education and went on to attend Palmer Business School, The Joseph Ρ. and Rebecca Levitan School of Business Administration, Stayers Business School and Temple University. She learned and was proficient at taking notes in shorthand - the Pittman System, of which is a dying shorthand system today.

Unfortunately, the exact date of Sister Pauline joining Mt. Pisgah A.M.E. Church is not known due to the records being destroyed in the fire of 1943, but her conversations would take you back to the time when the church was located at 4008-12 Locust Street, which could be during the administrations of Reverends Isaac N. Patterson, II (1930 to 1937) or Edward K. Nichols, Sr. (1937 to 1943).

Sister Pauline loved her church and was a devoted and dedicated member. In the Mt. Pisgah's Historical Journal (1833 to 1948), it notes that Sister Pauline was the President of the Philadelphia Conference Young People's Missionary Society; Delegate to the Quadrennial Young People's Missionary Convention held in New Orleans, La., August 1947; secretary of Mt. Pisgah Church School; Member of the Negro History and Culture Club (now replaced by the present day Historical Committee); Junior member of the Sarah Allen Guild of Mt. Pisgah, and a member of the Mt. Pisgah Secretarial Staff. Moving forth to the year of 1951, she answered the call in the organization of the Mt. Pisgah Lay Organization under the administration of Reverend Mansfield E. Jackson (1948) to 1958) and was the former corresponding secretary up to 2010. Sister Andrews was also one of the original members and secretary for the Mt. Pisgah LMP Federal Credit Union. Last but not the least, Sister Pauline was an active and life member of the Women's Missionary Society and traveled extensively for the A.M.E. Church as an Alternate Delegate, Delegate, and Observer for Conventions and General Conferences. She lived to see seven Philadelphia Annual General Conferences hosted by her beloved Mt. Pisgah A.M.E. Church.

Sister Pauline would be asked to a participant for some of Mt. Pisgah's Church School's special programs and from memory gave long and eloquently spoken recitations. Outside of the beautiful poetic speeches, Sister Pauline had a fantastic memory regarding the A.M.E. and Mt. Pisgah Church History. She remembered those faces and names of Mt. Pisgah's members of days passed, Rachael A. Thomas and Olive C. Drummond, members of Florida Grant Missionary; Charles E. Bostic, Mt. Pisgah Lay Delegate that was present at the infancy stages of the organization of the Lay in 1912, and of course, Joseph F. Walker, first president of Mt. Pisgah's Lay Organization. She had the opportunity to meet Attorney Herbert L. Dudley, Connectional President of the Lay Organization when he visited Mt. Pisgah in the late 1940s. If you wanted to know something about Mt. Pisgah, one would go to the one who knows or one would be directed to Sister Pauline. I, the writer of this tribute to Sister Pauline, inquired, "Was Mt. Pisgah always located at the corner of 41st and Spring Garden Streets"? Her response was "no," it was originally located at 40th and Locust Streets. Mt. Pisgah purchased this church from Centennial Methodist Episcopal Church in 1943. launched me into a project of researching Mt. Pisgah's history. A journey I have been on for the last ten years but that is another story. Sister Pauline was also a member of Mt. Pisgah's Chancel Choir.

Sister Pauline was an employee of the famous Afro American newspaper established in 1884 by Christopher James Perry, Jr., The Philadelphia Tribune. According to a recent article in the Tribune, she held the position as an executive secretary.

A SIDE HISTORICAL NOTE

The former Reeves Presbyterian Memorial, now the present Greater Mt. Olive A.M.E. Church, located on the corner of 50th and Aspen Streets has a stained glass window that was dedicated to the Founder of The Philadelphia Tribune, Mr. Christopher James Perry.

Irv Randolph, managing editor of The Philadelphia **Tribune**, said Andrews was the epitome of an oldschool secretary with perfect enunciation and a stickler for grammar. "I both hated and appreciated it when she would hand me marked-up copies of the paper that she had proofread. She didn't miss a thing," Randolph said. "She did not hold her tongue and would let you know if you fell below her high standards. But she could also be very sweet. In the morning, she would greet you with a big, warm smile. She gave me birthday cards that would include a personal message and a couple of dollars in them like a grandmother or a dear aunt would do. She will be missed."

Sister Pauline's newspaper experience carried over to the church. She at times would have a throw-away camera in her pocketbook and would take a picture of her subject at a moment's notice. I have been her subject on several occasions and shall cherish the developed photos given to me by her. She will also be remembered for a brief note or a card sent in the mail. If it were your birthday, a token gift was enclosed. Speaking of "mail", Sister Pauline was the "Official Postmistress of Mt. Pisgah's Christmas mail." A mailbox was prepared for her and a notice placed in the Church

bulletin that she was on duty to deliver Christmas mail to the Church membership during the Christmas holidays. This monumental feat has not been accomplished to date since she retired as Post Mistress

in 2010.

We shall remember and cherish the many memories and special times we shared with "A Lady of Legacy of Mt. Pisgah." As a tribute Sister Pauline, the Mt. Pisgah Church School will be distributing to its

members, Historical Footprints with articles from the Philadelphia Tribune, covering the year of her birth, 1925.
