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

Breeden Memorial Library, Leavenworth Center dedicated

Dr. Doug Breeden would like to see a lot of empty spaces on the shelves at the new Breeden Memorial Library at Leavenworth.

Speaking Saturday at an open house and dedication of the new facility, Breeden, a native of Leavenworth who now lives in Chapel Hill, N. C., said, "The library is here to be used. Nothing would give me greater joy than to come back and find a bunch of people in here reading and checking out the books. The worst thing that could happen would be to come in and find it untouched, unused."

The Breeden Foundation supplied matching funds for a Community Focus Fund grant that financed construction of the facility which houses a library dedicated to the memory of the late Russell and Ellen Breeden, Doug Breeden's grandparents, and in honor of his parents, Russ and Annabelle Breeden of Leavenworth.

A community center, used by the Ohio Valley Senior Citizens, is also located in the building.

The Breedens have long been pillars of the community and for many

years owned and operated a hatchery in Leavenworth.

Doug Breeden paid tribute to his grandparents and parents, noting their leadership and volunteerism.

His grandparents taught him a love of reading, he said. "Both were always reading something."

His parents taught him many things.

"For 50 years, Mom and Dad have provided employment for the community and us (their children)," he said, recalling debeaking chickens and traying eggs.

"Dad always had a vision, the dream of development." He said his father was active in early economic development action groups and area tourism promotions. "He was just 30 years ahead of his time.

"And Mom. Mom always made things happen, and she still is making things happen," said Breeden.

Breeden also praised contractor James Shireman.

When bids came in about twice the \$400,000 budget, Breeden said Shireman was the key to the project's success.

After cuts were made to trim the project, it was still "way over" said Breeden. "We sat down with Jim Shireman and he said, 'We can do this. We can make this happen.""

Also speaking at the dedication were Janet LaBreche, Crawford

County Public Library director; John Breeden, State Sen. Richard Young (D- Milltown), State Rep. Dennis Heeke (D-Dubois), and Russ Breeden II.

The new library is a branch of the Crawford County Public Library. LaBreche will oversee its operation.

"My heart is overwhelmed with gratitude," she said. "Who would have thought 10 years ago, even five years ago, that we would be here today dedicating this library?

She described how the Breeden family has traditionally read to their children.

"The names change but the story is the same across Leavenworth, Crawford County and the world," said LaBreche. "Fathers and mothers read to their children and dreamed of libraries filled with books.

"Jewell Sears (a founder and former director of the Crawford public library) watched more than one library wash away in flood waters. Yet the community said, 'We will work; we will build. We want a library for children and ourselves.' Thus, under the direction of Janice Holzbog, in 1995 a new county library was built.

"But it still was not enough. So Leavenworth town officials and Holzbog got together with the Breeden family and said, 'We will work. We will build.""

Grants were applied for and the Breedens invested generously in the project.

"And we came here to celebrate this day," said LaBreche.

John Breeden thanked all whose efforts resulted in completing the project. "Our grandparents would be very, very proud," he said.

Getting the facility built was not an easy task, said Sen. Young. "I know sometimes it seemed for every step forward, there were two steps backward. But in Crawford County, people work very hard in the face of adversity ... This is something the community will be proud of for many, many years."

Heeke said he had attended the ground breaking ceremony some time ago where he learned the history of the building razed to make room for the new one. "Now you are opening a lot of new history," said Heeke. "This is a great day."

Then Russ Breeden II talked about what the library will mean to the town and what the town means to him,

"But this is almost embarrassing," he added, referring to the praise heaped on him during the ceremony.

Town council president John Stutzman and Christine Pryer, a member of the Indiana Region 15 Plan Commission, key players in the project, were slated to participate in the dedication, but had

scheduling conflicts.

Two other Breeden family members who played a part in the new building were Roberta Breeden, who did the interior design, and Randy Coleman, husband of Kathy Breeden Coleman, who built the shelves and counters.

The ceremony concluded with a ribbon-cutting and tours of the building.

Invocation was given by the Rev. Emerson Abts and benediction was by the Rev. Michael McDaniel.

Music was furnished by The Sonshiners.

Refreshments were served in the

BML unveils addition

There were plenty of thanks to go around Saturday morning as Breeden Memorial Library at Leavenworth unveiled it approximately 4,000-square-foot renovation and expansion.

Doug Breeden; a Leavenworth native who with wife Josie financed the project, said libraries played an important role in his childhood and the couple want to give the commu-nity, including the children, the same opportunities he had. "We want to give that gift to the kids and the adults and all the peo-

ple" of the community by providing. them a place for "lifelong learning, he said.

BML, a branch of the Crawford County Public Library that was named for the Breeden family and is located in the same building as the Leavenworth Senior Citizens Center and the Crawford County United Ministries Food Pantry, increased its square footage from 1,104 to just over 5.000.

The project added 1,340 square feet to the library's west side as well as that amount to the basement. It also included renovation of the 1,242 square feet of basement below the existing library.

The upstairs area features room for more books and computers eight more computers are on the way - and a reading area, ideal for sen-iors who make their way over from the adjoining senior center. The downstairs area includes a children's and movie viewing area.

Breeden praised BML librarians Nikki Esarey and Sharon Harvey for the library's children's programs that have attracted more visitors to the facility.

"I'm just delighted we've engaged the center more than we had the last

few years," he said, noting his goal is community. to have a community-sustained library.

Josie Breeden praised the community for helping guide Doug when he was a boy, and said it is her and Doug's hope that the library, through its services and programs, can help the town guide today's children into becoming quality young people.

He noted how far the county's library system has come in the past decade, from one library located in English's flood plain to two new facilities.

Esarey presented the Breedens, who live in North Carolina, with a book to show the appreciation she and other staff, as well as the library's patrons, have for what the library has become.

"It seems unfair that I get to experience all the joy that people get at this library and you miss out," she said.

Others in attendance included State Rep. Dennie Oxley, D-English,

who proclaimed it was a "great day for Leavenworth," officials from the Community Foundation of County and the Crawford Leavenworth Town Council, and

representatives of builder James L. Shireman Inc. of Corydon.

Following remarks, visitors were treated to refreshments provided by the Leavenworth Senior Citizens.

Breeden Memorial Library After the Financial Panic of 2008/2009

Indiana State and Crawford County support was totally eliminated in 2011, when the State had a budget crisis amid drops in tax collections following the Financial Panic.

In 2011, despite the substantial impact of the Financial Panic, the Douglas Breeden Family renewed and increased their major support of the BML to approximately 80%-90% of funding. The Leavenworth community also stepped up their gifts to the BML. The Breeden Family has increased support in the ensuing years 2011-2024 and maintains funding at 80%- 90%. The BML has vigorous programs, given fine leadership by our librarians. Tina Brison has led the library for the last 6 years. Brother Russ Breeden is Chairman of the BML Operating Board, while Doug is Chairman of the Breeden Library Foundation, a 501c3 corporation.

<u>Elarion Neus</u> - Late Movember / early December 2010 Funding cuts strain library

The board of directors of the Crawford County Public Library, at its monthly meeting in November, agreed to table any decisions regarding the Breeden Memorial Library in Leavenworth until it has a chance to look at what options may be workable for the residents of Leavenworth and the library.

The library became the focus of concern recently when it was announced by the Indiana State Library Association that county libraries will lose significant funding from the state due to caps being placed on property taxes, which accounts for a major part of county library budgets. The announcement set in motion a scramble by library directors to somehow make up the funding losses from other sources, but most of those sources are strained as well, which limits the options available to many communities, including Crawford County.

Many libraries across the state, including those in Indianapolis, have already closed some library branches and have downsized personnel in an effort to keep the bills paid and the doors open to as many libraries as possihle. Crawford County dldn't escape the cuts, already realizing a \$20,000 deduction in funding with the possibility of more cuts in the future.

The main Crawford County Public Library building was built in English after the town relocated. Eventually, through the efforts of many in the Leavenworth area, Including Doug Breeden, a new library building/community center was built in Leavenworth. The building is owned by the town, and the main Crawford County library supplies most of the personnel, equipment and materials.

Doug Breeden contributed funding to the Leavenworth facility for several years but has not committed any funds to the operation recently, putting an even larger squeeze on the already strained budget. Breeden could not he reached for a comment about this story.

But the funding cuts will require decisions to be made, and library board members, who are sensitive to the needs of the Leavenworth community and the importance of having a library at that end of the county, are reluctant to give up on the possibility of saving the facility. But, as the days pass, the options are not looking good.

"The Town of Leavenworth actually owns the Breeden library building," said Dennie Stroud, who serves on the

library board. "The board is only responsible for the main library. We have no authority over the Breeden library. So, a lot of the decision-making will have to come from the town. They are really fortunate to have the building, but money has dried up and we have a totally different situation now than we had back when the library was built. There was some kind of an agreement for the main library to run it, but there's nothing in writing, no written agreement, so we can't go back and look at details that would now be really important. There are at least three or four townships that use the Breeden library, but it's not like we don't want them to have those services. But. it's strictly a money issue."

There have been some ideas thrown out during recent board meetings, like the main library donating the equipment at the Breeden library to the town and turning the day-to-day operations of the Leavenworth facility over to them.

"But we've actually made no declslon," said Amanda Rumage, president of the library board. "We are going to take another look at it after Jan. 1. We had a good turnout at the last meeting. About 25 to 30 people came, and about

Funding issues cloud Leavenworth branch's future

On a recent Thursday after-noon, 4-year-old Maggie Taylor, belly first on the floor of the Breeden Memorial Library in Leavenworth, excitedly held up a DVD she wanted her dad, Chad, to check out. Just a few feet away, her 1-1/2-year-old brother, Beau, played with some toys, and, a few feet in the other direction, Melissa Mayfield, 12, worked at a computer. On the other side of the building, teenagers Clay Fillbach and Rachel Harvey and adults quietly read and worked on a laptop.

In all, it was a normal day at the small library that has been serving not only Leavenworth but the surrounding communities for more than a decade.

The library's future, however, is in doubt. Despite no formal agreements able to be found. BML, with the assistance of annual contributions from Leavenworth native Doug Breeden, has operated under the auspices of the Crawford County Public Library in English. The continuation of those donations is uncer-

tain and a likely reduction in funding due to recently passed property tax caps has the library board searching for a solution. Several possibilities are being bandled, but the one that has drawn the most attention is BML's potential closing. Patrons say the closing of the library would be a tremendous loss for the area.

One of those is Nancy Simon, of Milltown. Simon, who has homeschooled her nine children (ages 2-1/2 to 21), makes the 15-to-20minute drive to BML every couple of weeks during the winter and more often in the summer, to supplement her teaching lessons.

"They have met my homeschool needs," she said. "I wouldn't have had the richness of all the books, because there's no way I would have been able to buy them."

Simon also praised the library's summer reading program, which her children have attended for several years. The fun, hands-on activities, which include drawings for prizes, have encouraged them to pick up books outside of their school lessons, she said. Coleen Fillbach, who lives a

"Our decision to make the changes was based on the loss of revenue," Dennie Stroud, president of the library board, said in an interview Friday. "We didn't want to wait until it was too late, so we went ahead and started the process. The revenue just wasn't there to support two libraries. Back in 1998, when the arrangement was made, things were much different. Since then, the cost in the Leavenworth facility.

of almost everything has escalated and we have became concerned about donations. But our main concern was to not lose sight of our patrons."

Stroud went on to say that the board made the decision to leave most of the inventory - including six computers, a good selection of movies and more than 15.000 books that are actually owned by the main library -

"We will have a meeting soon to finalize everything," he added. "We'll have our attorney there to make sure everything is done legal and proper, and certainly wish them (the Leavenworth group) the best. Whitney Timberlake has stepped up to the plate and took a leadership role with them and he has been wonderful to work with. Chad Schenck has become a go-between with Doug Breeden, and 1 believe things will begin to fall in place for them."


