Dear friends,

January was a challenging month for the buildings and congregations of Francis & Naomi Makemie Presbyterian Churches.

On Saturday January 7th, Eastern Virginia experienced a wallop of a snow storm. It snowed through the night and into Sunday. We cancelled church for January 8th due to the 15 inches of snow that fell. Just after I clicked send on the morning email 'snow' devotion, I had a knock on the manse door. Rick Turner had discovered a serious problem at the Naomi church. The heaters had failed and the air in the sanctuary and the rest of the building was filled with a cloud of soot. We shut down the heaters and filled the building with electric heaters due to the forecast of a temperature drop to 10 degrees for Monday. We kept a check on the building through the night. During the week it became clear that the building would not be useable by the next Sunday. The elders of the Francis church were quick to offer the opportunity for a joint service of worship and the elders of Naomi were quick to rejoice in the gift of gathering together in God's name. It was a fabulous service! The Francis church has her own building dilemma with a leaky roof. But, the two churches have resilience, resolve and large hearts.

The Naomi church is deep into the estimates for cleaning, heater repair, organ repair, and other items to bring the building back to full use. Worship will be in the fellowship hall for several weeks. All the programs are back in full swing! We are so grateful to the kindness and love so many have shown during this difficult time.

The Francis church is initiating the capital campaign to 'raise the roof'. This is February, a month where we show our love to our friends and neighbors and loved ones. And we share our love and thanks to you. We thank you for being part of our life as you read this newsletter every month. And we thank you for who you are. Love and blessings to you.

On Saturday, January 14 the Session held its annual training retreat and stated meeting. The opening devotion was based on our call from God as revealed in 1 Corinthians 1:1-9. Tracey Arvidson was granted voice and vote since her ordination was moved to the following day.

This will allow activities to resume on January 19 and worship on the 22 nd . It will take the commercial cleaners several weeks to restore the sanctuary.

- Joe's Gang is happy to have the participation of anyone needing community service hours.
- Dick Freeman will complete the performance appraisal process on January 19.

Mission:

- The final Helen Bunch Memorial Blood Drive will be February 14.

Presence:

- There was a consensus on using liturgists in place of or in addition to scripture readers in worship.
- Two families will be encouraged to sign up for refreshments on Easter and on the Christmas Program dates.

- The Shepherd Program welcomes Donna and Steve Doan as the newest Shepherds. New assignments are in draft form.

Moderator:

- Due to the recent snow, communion and the installation and ordination of Ruling Elders was moved to January 15.

Francis Makemie Presbyterian Church is a long standing congregation located in the small town of Accomac Virginia on the corner of Cross St and Back St. The congregation was established in 1837. We are part of the Presbytery of Eastern Virginia and the PCUSA. Our little church is the only church in our denomination to bear

the name of the founder of the Presbyterian Church in These United States.

Francis Makemie was born in Northern Ireland of Scottish parents about 1658 and was ordained in 1682 with the express intention of going to colonial America as an evangelist of the Reformed Faith. A preacher and a champion of religious freedom, he applied an organizing genius for integration for the common good. No matter how long the history of a particular congregation, each Presbyterian church was once a new church development-a mission church-brought to life by Presbyterians working together. Francis Makemie settled in Accomack County, Virginia.

On the grounds of our church, one can see the fine monument that commemorates his ministry.

Presbyterian unity for mission in Christ's name is the living legacy of Francis Makemie.

Our church is an historic building which continues in worship and ministry to this day. Unfortunately, our building has suffered the rigors of harsh weather and is now in immediate need of a new roof and some painting indoors. The roof currently is leaking in the building with each rainstorm. Buckets, towels and other methods are being used to try maintain the interior of the building each time it rains.

It is for this reason we are launching a **Raise the Roof Capital Campaign**. The estimated cost of the project will be \$15,000. We want everyone to have the opportunity to participate in our campaign. So we invite you to join in and help us as we go forward for the secure future of our church.



Thanks to their quick thinking the people from the Virginia Aquarium came and brought the turtle back to the aquarium for care. Thank you Jack & Jody for your care and concern for the environment!

Visitors to Fisherman Island Become Part of Turtle Rescue Effort

 Cold and wind threatened to dampen the spirits of 17 visitors on a scheduled Christmas Eve tour to Fisherman Island in the Eastern Shore Wildlife Refuge. As volunteers Bob Toner and Jack and Jody Humphreys led the tour down the trail towards the beach, and within about 90 feet of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel, the experience took an extraordinary turn when visitors stumbled on a large loggerhead sea turtle.
 Upon first locating the turtle and dragging it out of the surf, it was thought to be deceased. Toner tapped the turtle's head, and to their surprise, it squinted its eyes and moved its head. It was then that they realized that the turtle was clinging to life. The volunteers quickly alerted on-duty Park Ranger Max Louanida. The Virginia Aquarium Stranding Response team was contacted to coordinate its pick up.
 While waiting for the stranding team to arrive, and under the phone guidance of the stranding team, the turtle was picked up and placed in a waiting U.S. Fish and Wildlife Vehicle. Upon closer inspection, it was found that the turtle's carapace, or shell, was heavily encrusted with barnacles and sand. Once the turtle realized it was out of the rain and cold surf, it started to move around.
 Northampton County is no stranger to

stranded sea turtles. In fact, according to the Marine Mammal and Sea Turtle Response Report published in 2013 by the Virginia Aquarium and Marine Science Center, the county and accounted for the majority of sea turtle strandings in 2012. According to the report, most strandings occurred in the lower Chesapeake Bay area. Fisherman Island, in Northampton County is the southernmost tip of the Delmarva Peninsula, hence where the majority of strandings were located.
 Sadly, according to the report, the vast majority of loggerhead Sea Turtles that were located by the stranding team in 2012 were deceased. This is an unfortunate statistic for the loggerhead sea turtle, which is currently listed as an endangered species under the Endangered Species Act of 1973. It remains endangered to this day.
 Members of the stranding team arrived within 35 minutes of the call being placed and quickly transferred the loggerhead sea turtle to a crate. Some vital signs were taken, and it was noted that the turtle's temperature had dropped to a critical 47 degrees, its breathing was labored and water could be heard in its lungs. This was not a good sign, and stranding team members quickly transported the turtle off from Fisherman Island to its facility in Virginia Beach where it would be warmed up slowly, rehabilitated and hopefully released back to the Chesapeake Bay. At the conclusion of the rescue, visitors praised the

quick response of volunteers, refuge staff and the Virginia Aquarium's Stranding Response Team.
 At last report from the Virginia Aquarium, the turtle's shell had been cleaned and was found to be undamaged. It was moved to a larger tank where it was beginning to dine on jolly fish. It will be held

there until the water warms and it can be released back into the lower Chesapeake Bay.
 Max Louanida is the visitor services park ranger at the Eastern Shore of Virginia National Wildlife Refuge, part of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service near Kiptopeke.
