The Mr. and Ms. UN were Mr. USA (Michael Angelo Acielo) and Ms.



Third year students all over the country took the National Career Assessment Examination, September 30.


To give sufficient time for comprehensive career guidance to high school students before they enter the tertiary level, the Department of Education (DepEd) through the National Educational Testing and Research Center (NETRC) administered the SY: 2011 – 2012 National Career Assessment Examination (NCAE). It was given to: third year high school students as an amendment to DepEd Memorandum No. 270, s.2007; and fourth year high school students who are applicants to CHED and TESDA Scholarship Programs in accordance to DepEd Order

No. 28, S. 2011.

Starting school year 2012 – 2013, the NCAE will be administered every last Wednesday of August of the succeeding years to all third year high school students and fourth year high school students – applicants to CHED and TESDA Scholarship Programs in all public and private secondary schools with permit to operate.

The results of the NCAE will show the interest and career inclination of the student, whether it is technical-vocational, entrepreneurial or a full college education course.

The NCAE, originally scheduled for September 28, had been postponed in Luzon due to heavy rains brought by typhoon “Pedring.”

teaching Science I and II and is the school's SLC adviser. Ma'am Rea is teaching AP I, III and IV.


Sir Wilson is still not sure about his career plans after passing the LET while Ma'am Rea is now applying for an item in a public school.

"I thank God for the big blessing for finally letting me pass the LET," exalted Ma'am Rea.




THERE ARE TIMES I FEEL ALONE,
