MEMBERSHIP UPDATE AND RENEWAL REMINDER JANUARY 2026

You can pay your dues in-person, by mail, or online. Dues should be mailed to PACMOAA, P.O. Box 5353, Portsmouth, VA 23703. Thank you to the many members that made a multiyear payment for dues!! Members that paid for 2 or 3 years in 2024 or earlier may need to renew this year. Remember, multiyear payments give you a discount. See attached dues renewal form at the end of the newsletter for details. **Only 1/3 of our members need to pay dues in 2026** and I will notify you via email or phone if you owe dues for this year. Thank you all for utilizing the multiyear form of payment, you have made my job collecting dues much easier!! If you're not sure if you owe dues, check with Hans Sachse or Sherry.

Your PACMOAA dues money enables PACMOAA to pay for things like the newsletter; speaker expenses; VCOC dues and expenses; admin expenses like name tags, printing, postage; and entertainment like the Tidewater Concert Band that performed at our Christmas Concert.

MOAA dues are paid separate from PACMOAA dues, and a significant portion of that money contributes to legislative advocacy. "MOAA advocates with Congress, DoD, the VA, Department of Homeland Security (DHS), and other departments to **preserve and protect earned benefits for our uniformed services, veterans, their families, and surviving spouses through advocacy, leadership, education, and service**, fulfilling MOAA's promise to "Never Stop Serving." MOAA has encouraged basic membership especially for new officers over the past 10 years or so as a way to show them the benefits of belonging. Unfortunately, basic membership does not help pay for the legislative advocacy MOAA does in Washington or any of the other expenses for maintaining the resources and benefits of the organization. Currently, about 20% of PACMOAA members are MOAA basic members. At the December MOAA Monthly Virtual Chapter Roundtable, it was stressed that chapters need to work on elevating their basic members to premium or life membership. With many of our members belonging to multiple service-related organizations it is difficult to keep track of your status with each one so I will remind members if they are basic members as well as providing information on how to change their membership status.

Maintaining and/or increasing membership is essential for a chapter to survive and thrive. The PACMOAA Goals in order are Membership, Legislative, and Community Activities. Without adequate membership, legislative advocacy and community involvement are severely impacted!

PACMOAA ended 2025 with 74 members – 59 regular and 15 Surviving Spouses, up from 67 in Dec 2024. New members increased also from 8 in 2024 to 9 in 2025! **Thank you all for helping with recruiting this year** and please continue to invite eligible colleagues, friends, or neighbors to a dinner meeting. This is a great way to introduce them to PACMOAA. Potential members can attend a dinner meeting for $\frac{1}{2}$ the usual price. PERSONAL AFFAIRS JANUARY 2026 PARKINSON'S DISEASE

Many of us know friends and/or family who are living with Parkinsons or died from complications associated with Parkinsons. As I've mentioned several times before, at least 5 of our longtime members have died in the past 3 years from complications associated with this disease. Kathryn Wiesmann, MPH, Chapter Coordinator for the *American Parkinsons Disease Association (APDA)* in Virginia spoke at the Lake Prince Woods Retired Nurses Group meeting recently. I knew there was an increased incidence in veterans especially from the Vietnam War due to Agent Orange, but herbicides and pesticides used in farming as well as head injuries are additional risk factors! Southern and rural areas have higher rates of Parkinsons as do older men.

I did not realize there are 3 different Parkinsons Foundations.

- American Parkinsons Disease Association at www.apdaparkinson.org/virginia, 757-495-3062. The 2 state representatives live in the Hampton Roads area and are readily available for assistance. This group provides grassroots support and assists with local activities.

Better Access to Your Health Care Benefit: A Look at the Military CARE Act

A bipartisan House bill introduced Dec. 17 would require the Pentagon to establish a digital system designed to improve access to care at military treatment facilities (MTFs) by providing greater data and transparency on beneficiary access challenges – a key MOAA legislative priority.

The [Military Care Access, Reporting, and Evaluation \(CARE\) Act](#) (H.R. 6796) mandates a system that:

- Allows all TRICARE beneficiaries to submit and track a complaint about MTF barriers to accessing care.
- Sends access complaints to the proper patient advocate.
- Aggregates those complaints for use by the Defense Health Agency (DHA) to help officials address widespread problems.

“Without reliable data and transparency, access-to-care problems in the military health system remain unseen and unresolved,” MOAA President and CEO Lt. Gen. Brian T. Kelly, USAF (Ret), said [in a press release](#) announcing the bill’s introduction. “The Military CARE Act ensures beneficiary experiences are captured, tracked, and reported – giving leaders and Congress the visibility needed to identify systemic issues and drive meaningful, lasting improvements for military families.”

The bill, sponsored by Reps. Steven Horsford (D-Nev.), Jen Kiggans (R-Va.), Chrissy Houlahan (D-Pa.), and Don Bacon (R-Neb.), also requires reports on the most common access-to-care complaint filed at each MTF, along with deeper looks into specialty and pediatric care. It also mandates each facility provide “a summary of steps taken ... to reduce access to care complaints by covered beneficiaries.”

The Military CARE Act is the result of grassroots efforts – MOAA took this issue to Capitol Hill as part of the [2025 Advocacy in Action event](#). MOAA members from across the nation converged on Washington, D.C., in April to meet with lawmakers and advance our legislative agenda, including improving access to health care for military families.

Why This System Matters

Military families face multiple hurdles navigating a complex health care benefit – everything from frequent PCS moves to an [unstable military health system](#). Many reach a new duty station only to be greeted by MTF appointment shortages and referral delays … and patient-advocacy resources at these facilities vary widely across the force.

The establishment of a systemwide digital platform would help all beneficiaries know where to go with their complaints, ensure their issues are forwarded to individuals who can help them secure their earned health care benefit, and compile data to help DHA leaders and Congress address problems – whether it's a single MTF facing a series of challenges or a forcewide issue faced by beneficiaries in multiple locations.

Congress mandated a similar system in 2019 to address military family housing concerns amid increased reports of hazardous living conditions. The [DoD Housing Feedback System](#) offers a centralized database for tenant complaints, landlord responses, and actionable data that can shed light on widespread problems.

“This bipartisan bill gives military families a real voice, gives providers the tools to respond quickly, and gives Congress the oversight needed to ensure servicemembers and their loved ones are never left behind,” Horsford said in the press release. “When we support our families, we strengthen the entire force.”

Existing systems, such as the [Interactive Customer Evaluation \(ICE\)](#) application, may field some TRICARE access-related complaints, but they are used infrequently, lack consistency in how submissions are handled, and have few reporting mandates. The establishment of a complete, transparent reporting platform will offer beneficiaries the tool they need to ensure their service-earned benefit is fully provided.

Our military families deserve timely care and a clear path to raise concerns when the system falls short,” Bacon said in the release. “The Military CARE Act gives servicemembers and their families a direct line to report care access issues and track their resolution, while ensuring Congress has the data needed to identify and fix systemic problems across the military health system.”

Alongside MOAA, the bill is supported by military and veterans organizations such as AMVETS, the National Military Family Association, the TRICARE for Kids Coalition, and Vietnam Veterans of America. Long-Sought Fix for Combat-Wounded Veterans Takes New Path in Congress

The Major Richard Star Act, a bipartisan effort to fix a long-standing injustice in the military retirement and disability compensation system, has taken a significant procedural step in Congress as lawmakers look to move the issue forward before the end of the year.

The MOAA-supported bill ([H.R. 2102](#) | [S. 1032](#)) eliminates a dollar-for-dollar offset faced by servicemembers whose combat-related injuries force them to medically retire before the 20-year mark. Ending this “[wounded veteran tax](#)” would allow eligible veterans to receive both full retirement pay and full disability compensation.

In a strategic shift to advance the legislation in this session of Congress, Sens. Richard Blumenthal (D-Conn.), Mike Crapo (R-Idaho), and Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.) have filed the text of the bill as an amendment to House-passed appropriations legislation ([H.R. 4016](#)).

[TAKE ACTION: [Ask Your Lawmakers to Support the Star Act Amendment \(Senate Amendment 4056\) to H.R. 4016](#)]

That House bill contains five of the [12 annual funding bills](#) often viewed as must-pass legislation for federal operations, including money for:

- Defense
- Commerce, Justice and Science
- Interior
- Labor/Health and Human Services
- Transportation/Housing and Urban Development

By offering the Major Richard Star Act as an amendment to this package, sponsors hope to give members of both chambers an opportunity to vote on the issue in the context of essential federal spending legislation.

Why This Matters Now

Attaching the legislation to must-pass funding bills represents a key shift in advocacy strategy as the first session of 119th Congress winds down. Because the standalone bills have faced procedural hurdles over the past seven years, leveraging the appropriations process may provide the best remaining opportunity to secure floor consideration and a recorded vote in the coming weeks.

MOAA continues to highlight that this reform carries modest budgetary impact relative to its importance to veterans' families and supporters, and stresses that military retirement pay and disability compensation are distinct entitlements earned through service and sacrifice.

VCOC LEGISLATIVE REPORT & JLC UPDATE

VIRGINIA MILITARY SURVIVORS AND DEPENDENTS EDUCATION PROGRAM (VMSDEP) UPDATE

As of 25 Dec 2025

Kayla Owens, the Co-Founder of the Friends of VMSDEP (your “official” grassroots advocacy organization per their Facebook page) was appointed to the Board of Veterans Services (BVS) in July 2025. Since the 2026 General Assembly Session will vote on a new budget, funding for VMSDEP will again be a target. The VMSDEP Working Group was established at the 10 Nov meeting of BVS and held meetings three times before the 17 Dec BVS meeting.

Recognizing drafting legislation requires one consistent, authoritative data set used by everyone (the General Assembly, institutions of higher education, and state agencies) the working committee wrote a draft white paper “to brief the incoming administration, transition team, and members of the General Assembly on VMSDEP’s history, what went wrong in 2024, and what needs to be fixed going forward”. They also recommended sending coordinated data request letters to the Dept of Veterans Services (DVS), SCHEV, and Virginia’s public colleges and universities requesting VMSDEP data and building an official record.

Both actions passed the BVS and then JLC. As a result of that vote, VMSDEP rose to the top of the JLC 2026 Initiatives per the 20 Dec 2025 posting of Kayla Owens! As of 25 December, the JLC Initiatives have not changed. <https://www.dvs.virginia.gov/about-us/boards-foundations/joint-leadership-council-of-veterans-service-organizations>.

This overview of the 2024 General Assembly attempted changes to the VMSDEP Program were included in the VMSDEP White Paper under *History and Eligibility Evolution of VMSDEP: 2024 – Budget language enacted*

during the regular legislative session temporarily altered program structure and benefit coordination. Following identified implementation challenges and unintended consequences, the Governor convened a VMSDEP Task Force to assess impacts and recommend solutions. In July 2024, during a special session, the

General Assembly fully repealed the enacted changes, restored VMSDEP to its prior statutory framework, and appropriated approximately \$120 million in state funding over the 2024–2026 biennium to offset losses reported by public institutions of higher education.

NOTE: No permanent funding mechanism was established as part of this action.

As we head into January, be aware that the General Assembly legislative session begins on **January 14** for a long, 60-day session and the first bills were filed in mid-November!

The next BVS VMSDEP Working Group meeting will be held on January 9 at 9:00 a.m., with a virtual attendance option available. Additional details will be shared closer to the meeting.

We will keep members updated as soon as possible about any votes that you need to give feedback to your legislators related to VMSDEP. Making sure your senator and delegate know your stance on VMSDEP before it becomes a hot topic might be helpful. I will be happy to share the white paper on VMSDEP with anyone interested in it.
