

The troubles of life can make us cranky and out of sorts, but we should never excuse these bouts of bad behavior, for they can wither the hearts of those we love and spread misery all around us. We have not fulfilled our duty to others until we have learned to be pleasant. There is a word for a virtue that corrects our unpleasantness—*gentleness*, a term that suggests a kind and gracious soul.

Gentleness is a willingness to accept limitations and ailments without taking out our aggravation on others. It shows gratitude for the smallest service rendered and tolerance for those who do not serve us well. It puts up with bothersome people—especially noisy, boisterous little people; for kindness to children is a crowning mark of a good and gentle person. It speaks softly in the face of provocation. It can be silent; for calm, unruffled silence is often the most eloquent response to unkind words.

One story that illustrates this concept of gentleness tells of a corporal at Valley Forge who was directing three men as they tried to lift a log into place. It was too heavy, but the corporal commanded again and again, "All right, men, one, two, three, lift!" A man in an overcoat came by and said to the corporal, 'Why don't you help them?" The corporal pulled himself up to full height and replied, "Sir, I am a corporal." Without a word the man stepped over and with his help the log went easily into place. The man was George Washington.

Gentleness means to be ready to do whatever is good, to slander no one, to be peaceable (that is, not quarrelsome), to be considerate, and to show true humble gentleness toward everyone. It includes the idea of springing to the help of those in need yet keeping our own feelings under control.

Endeavor in the lights that you have been given to be that gentle person someone needs today. And if you can't see your way to do it ask the Lord to help. He knows all about being gentle and kind to others no matter if they deserve it or not. Dr. Rob Ayers, Assistant Moderator

"NEWS FROM OUR CHURCHES"

Bethany: The saints at Bethany continued to encourage and pray for one another during the virus restrictions. Our deacons contacted the members of their Care Groups weekly. The pastor and deacons met weekly to serve the congregation more effectively. We currently plan to resume meeting (under the guidelines of the county) on Sunday, March 24 at 10:30 a.m.

Bethlehem: Social distancing is not fun, but we must have faith over fear, as the Bible tells us to do. In May we lost a very dear member of our church family, Pastor Corbett Martin. He was a wonderful pastor and friend to everyone he met. He will be missed terribly. During our distancing we are still trying to do community outreaches. We do community cafe and fill up the little pantries. We have taken this time to do some remodeling on our entry way. We were able through lots of prayers to purchase some adjoining property for the church. We have had three baptisms, two high school graduates and one college graduate this year. We are very proud of these people. God Bless and Stay safe.

Broadway: We observed the STAY HOME mandate from March 23 to May 9. Members kept in touch with calls and Facebook. Pastor Gray used the church's telephone calling system to encourage members to have their own Prayer Meeting on Wednesdays at 6:30, and members continued to place friends and family on the prayer list. Several used Pastor Gray's sermons at www.broadwaybaptistsedalia.org in their personal Sunday worship. Pastor used Numbers 6:24-26, Psalm 27:1, 2 Corinthians 4:8, Philippians 4:6, 2 Timothy 1:7 KJV, and 1 John 4:18 with Dr. Yeats (MBC) quote "God is aware of the virus, is allowing it, and knows when it will end" as further encouragement. He reminded us that many people want to promote fear, especially those who don't acknowledge our all-powerful, all-knowing God who is present everywhere. On our return May 10, we celebrated Mothers Day and Resurrection Day with The Lord's Supper. We purchased face shields described in the Sedalia newspaper and face masks from Staples for members and visitors.

Calvary: Online attendance has been outstanding over the pandemic and God's people have been faithful to God in their tithes and offerings. Calvary Baptist will begin in person worship services Sunday May 31st at 8:15 & 10:00 am. We must social distance so only 50 people may attend each service. Please call the church office to reserve your spot. The 10:00 am service on Sunday and Wednesday night Prayer Meeting will continue to Livestreamed on Facebook Live and You Tube.

East Sedalia: The leaders of the children/youth outreach took a caravan of cars and the church bus to visit the children and youth to point them to Jesus during their time of being out of school. Gifts included homemade cookies, candy, magazines, news letters, etc. The food distribution was held again in May and 200 people were served. On Mother's Day we met on the church lot to hear Pastor Tim's message from our cars. A potted plant was given to the youngest and the oldest mother present. Each mother present was given a wonderful devotional book "Woman of God Wonderfully Made." We are still able to hear the Sunday morning and Monday and Wednesday evening services through the web, face book or zoom. Beginning May 24th we will be back in the sanctuary for Sunday morning service with social distancing and other precautions taken that are necessary. No other activities in the church will be held at this time. The face book and on line services will continue for those not feeling comfortable to attend worship at the church on Sunday mornings.

Katy Park: We hosted an outside drive-in church for Mother's Day Sunday May 10th, and handed out roses to the mothers. We returned back to two Sunday morning services, 9:30 a.m. and 11:00 a.m., on Sunday May 17th. We resumed Wednesday night Bible study and youth activities at the church Wednesday May 27th, but we are holding off on children activities until further notice.

Mt Herman: We have not met inside the church for several weeks, we are staying together by prayer texts and phone calls. Bro. Sisney has been preaching to empty pews and You Tube to send to members. For the last weeks we have enjoyed "drive-in" worship with good attendance. Soon to be back inside, we hope!
