Member Profile: Don Rogers

Sitting in my chair at the Oktoberfest car show, I noticed a gentleman with a little green and white Metropolitan parked behind me. He seemed preoccupied, so I didn't bother him, he would look up from time-to-time and answer questions about the little car. My chair was pretty close to his, so to be friendly I asked him if he was in a car club. His answer sort of threw me..."Yes" he replied, "Willamette Valley Street Rods"!

Needless to say, the conversation got around to asking him for a member profile. Don said he does not come to the meetings, and it was his wife Lizabeth who had signed them up. Lizabeth and Don have a blended family, with 3 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren! She was not able to be at the show. They have been members for 5 months.



Don is one of the most

interesting people I have run across in a long time! I was spellbound listening to him, he had so much to say! I began by asking him what cars he has...oh did that open the door, so to speak! Don has the following vehicles in his garage: 1960, 1962, and a 2012 Corvette, the 1957 Metropolitan (he has more of them), a 2002 Prowler, 1954 Chevy Bel Aire, 1969 Ranchero, 1955 F-100 PU, 1956 Chevy PU and a 1929 Grand Paige. This is only a partial list. Now, do you think I asked him if the club could do a shop tour? Oh yeah, and he graciously agreed! This will be interesting!

Now if the cars were all he had to talk about, I still would have hung on every word, but when he began to tell the story of his Grand Paige, he said that was the start of the Dodge Brothers 1929-1934. He went on to tell me about a car he bought that had belonged to "Pretty Boy" Floyd. He didn't say that at first, he said it belonged to Charles Floyd. You will have to ask him because I was writing so fast I can't read my own notes, but it either sold, or was sold to him in 1929 for \$995.00. It was a Model 612 Sedan with suicide doors. Floyd and a few cohorts hit 5 banks in Oklahoma and were hiding in the panhandle. The sheriff found them and said he could either kill them, or ...he made them take their shoes off an walk back to town; he confiscated the car! He was sheriff from 1929-1948, and the car wasoh you better get from Don, he tells it much better!

I asked Don about his background, and he said he was in the motion picture industry. He began like this: It was his first day on the job at a studio, and he had to push a cart with a huge disk type player machine up to a sound studio. It was too large plate type disks for choreographers to use somehow, but anyway he got it to the studio and was to help with the sound for a movie. Behind a glass he saw Clint Walker. Don was really embarrassed when he called him Mr. Eastwood, to which Clint Walker replied "No, I'm the other Clint!". He goes on to say that they had been in there hearing the same start and stop many times for the choreographed scene with the dancers. Don would watch as they danced in front of a 75x20 foot mirror. The door opened and a blonde lady with messy hair came in. She looked half asleep, and went in to begin her part in the film. About half an hour later the phone rang, and Don answered it. The man on the line asked if

Mrs. DiMaggio was still there. It was Marilyn Monroe! Setting the bar on those disks for the dancers cues was long and tiring, It was for a film called "There's No Business Like Show Business". He worked many times in the studio until 2:30 in the morning.

Don Rogers was good at what he did. He was a Navy pilot in the Korean war, but Don says he never saw any action. The action he did see came later in Hollywood. Don would go on to produce the sound for a list of A movies including the 1954 movie filmed at Fox ranch, "Untamed". He showed up at the ranch, and a fella named Bernard Fredricks told him "You are on the boom!". I think from there Fredricks told him to "Come see him for a job.", (again my notes are too scribbled)

I have to make this a bit more concise, but it is hard. I will list the things that I found to be so hard to pull away from hearing about.

Don sound produced the following movies (partial list): Carousel, The King & I, South Pacific, Diary of Ann Frank, Can Can...and many more. Spartacus, The Alamo...Cleopatra! In 1963 he worked on The Bible, West Side Story, Sound of Music. You may have heard of some others; like Star Wars, The Empire Strikes Back, First Blood. Somewhere in there the story of the helicopter shots was told, but you can ask Don about that. In addition to his post production sound work on major motion pictures, Don was Vice President of the Academy of Arts and Sciences...(you know, the guys who do the Oscars!) In fact, it was the Academy that gave Don a "Lifetime Achievement Award". The Oscar was present by Richard Dreyfus in 1996. He was 25 years on the Board of Governors for the Academy.

I think my favorite part to tell you about is the technological wonders that Don was instrumental in creating. Technicolor Studio gave Don and his partner \$25,000,000 to produce the equipment that would take film from celluloid to digital format, he also did the same with sound. So if you like the digital age of movies, digital tunes and streaming, you have this guy here to thank!

One more Don story.

Don said a writer that was not well known came to him when he was working for a Hollywood Studio and had creative license so to speak. The guy said he had a money maker script, and his last script had turned out ok, so Don began to read it. He thought it would be a "blockbuster", Ok he told the guy, it will cost X amount of dollars. The writer said he didn't have any money, and asked if he could use the sound stages during the night when other movies were home for the night. In any case, the story evolved. The studio head said no, he would not front the money for the film, but Don told the guy ok. Every time an invoice came in on the picture, he would hide it in his desk, When the picture was complete, he showed it to the studio who said it was going to be a "blockbuster", just what Don had said. Then he handed the boss the invoices. The story this writer brought to Don that Day was Rocky with Sylvester Stallone! Don went on to do Rocky 2.

With all the stories and all the things Don has done, I never detected one bit of bragging, just the love he had for what he did. His wife is making a documentary titled "Hot Water", about unsafe water..

I asked Don "Of all you have done and the people you have known, if you had one memento from all those years, what would it be?" He kinda put his head down, and almost inaudibly said "My Oscar". He never thought he would ever do anything so amazing as to be recognized in that way.

Go find Don, but be prepared to sit and be amazed like I was. He has a great sense of humor, and a big smile to match his big heart. Oh, by the way, Thank you Don for the Oktoberfest lunch! I am sure looking forward to that shop tour!

A Project

1. Frank and Jeff trying to attach the chrome molding that goes around the cowl. The little nibs in the body are worn so the molding would not stay in place.

So they are going to install screws on top of the nibs to hold the molding in place.

- 2. Frank installing screws into the nibs.
- 3. John and Glen installing the headlight bar.
- 4. Ray bolting on the fuel block off plate because we are using an electric fuel pump.
- 5. Rod is drilling holes to mount the ignition switch and headlight switch in the lower seat frame.

- 6. Rod taking off the headers and the intake manifold because we are getting new carbs and manifold. The old ones need too much work.
- 7. Frank and Ray unbolting the manifold.
- 8. Ooops....motor coming out of car. All because of the engine in the way of mounting the brake pedal. Jeff will paint the engine to match color of body.
- 9. While Thor takes advantage of the motor being out, he crawls in to tighten the bolts on molding on the cowl.

Sometimes you got to go backwards to go farther forward!
