Annotated Bibliography & Works Cited

Annotated Bibliography:

You are required to keep an ONGOING **Annotated Bibliography** as you conduct research for your paper. This document must be in **MLA8 style**. You may use **EasyBib** to make your Annotated Bibliography. The purpose is to help you understand your SOURCE MATERIAL and to HELP YOU FOCUS on your topic. You might not **CITE** all of the sources in the ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY in your final draft.

Example from an ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY:

Waite, Linda J., et al. "Nonfamily Living and the Erosion of Traditional Family Orientations Among Young Adults." *American Sociological Review*, vol. 51, no. 4, 1986, pp. 541-554.

The authors, researchers at the Rand Corporation and Brown University, use data from the National Longitudinal Surveys of Young Women and Young Men to test their hypothesis that nonfamily living by young adults alters their attitudes, values, plans, and expectations, moving them away from their belief in traditional sex roles. They find their hypothesis strongly supported in young females, while the effects were fewer in studies of young males. Increasing the time away from parents before marrying increased individualism, self-sufficiency, and changes in attitudes about families. In contrast, an earlier study by Williams cited below shows no significant gender differences in sex role attitudes as a result of nonfamily living.

Works Cited:

After you write your paper, you will create a 2nd document called the a **Works Cited** page. It is in the same format, **MLA8**, as the Annotated Bibliography. The Works Cited page only includes the sources that you quote or paraphrase, and cite in your paper. It does not include the annotations. You must turn in both documents with your final draft.
