





MONTH: **January 31, 2023** TOPIC: **AUTHOR: Franz Kafka LEADER: Rachel Taylor** SUMMARY:

The Metamorphosis is a novella by Franz Kafka, first published in 1915. It has been cited as one of the seminal works of fiction of the 20th century and is studied in colleges and universities across the Western world. The story begins with a traveling salesman, Gregor Samsa, waking to find himself transformed (metamorphosed) into a large, monstrous insect-like creature. The cause of Samsa's transformation is never revealed, and Kafka himself never gave an explanation. The rest of Kafka's novella deals with Gregor's attempts to adjust to his new condition as he deals with being burdensome to his parents and sister, who are repulsed by the horrible, verminous creature Gregor has become. BOOK: Czech Political Prisoners: Recovering Face (2012) **AUTHOR: Dr. Jana Kopelent-Rehak** 

LEADER: Mila Saskova-Pierce, Ph.D.

SUMMARY:

Czech Political Prisoners: Recovering Face is about the legacy of political violence under socialism in the heart of Eastern Europe. In light of reconciliation in post-socialist Czech Republic, former political prisoners' various memories reveal how the notions of time, space, and law were altered under the long-term terror of a totalitarian regime. Claiming their lost social face, political prisoners reveal their redefined subjectivities and new forms of social relations--kinship and citizenship. Czech Political Prisoners: Recovering Face is the story of men and women who survived Czechoslovakian concentration camps under the Communist regime. Men and women disappeared, were arrested, imprisoned, interrogated, tortured, put on trial, convicted, and sentenced to forced labor camps. In 1948 in Czechoslovakia, political others became political prisoners. ... in the Czech Republic, as well as in other post-socialist countries, the desire to reconcile is not limited to survivors of camps, prisoners, and dissidents. People from the youngest generation are asking questions about crimes, punishment, and forgiveness related to the Communist regime in central and eastern Europe. **AUTHOR: John Amos Comenius** 

**LEADER:** Timothy Pierce (Published adapted versions 2021/2022) SUMMARY:

If you loved Pilarim's Progress, you need to discovered what inspired it. Labvrinth of the World is the original pilgrim allegory. Penned 400 years ago, today it is virtually unknown in English. The author, John Amos Comenius, lived most of his life in exile. He also lost his entire family to the plaque. Both in life and allegory, Comenius illustrates the teachings of the New Testament being the kingdom of God amongst the kingdoms of men - which religious institutionalism has all but forgotten. This tale will inspire you to become a contrast to the growing unrest of the world we live in today. (Source: back book cover)

MONTH: April 25, 2023 BOOK: The Journey (1977) AUTHOR: Cecilia Sternberg LEADER: Hana Walsserová. Ph.D. SUMMARY:

This thrilling memoir focuses on the life of Czech nobles from the Sternberg family told from the perspective of Cecilia. It retells the pre-war family life, as well as their aristocratic and well-connected life prior and under Nazi occupation, and when Nazis confiscated their family home Častolovice. The story also tells how Count and Countess Sternberg with their daughter Diana fled Czechoslovakia as the Communists came to power in 1948 with the help of the American ambassador in Prague, Laurence Steinhardt. It is an important and well-written account of one important European noble families related to the Bismarks, who also witness complex diplomacies or divided loyalty among nobles prior the occupation of Sudetenland and during the Austrian Anschluss. It can be read as an alternative European history. The book also narrates with good humor how the family of these Czech refugees settled in New York, and how they faced their setbacks in the US. Eventually, they settled in St. Petersburg, Florida in 1952, where the countess sold homemade iewelry on the waterfront while the count sat in his underwear on the porch drinking wine and reading the Constitution of the United States before moving on to Jamaica.

MONTH: May 30, 2023 BOOK: Czech Folk Tales (1917) **AUTHOR Josef Baudis** LEADERS: Mila Saskova-Pierce, Ph.D. SUMMARY:

The selection has been made from all sorts of folk tales, artistic and primitive alike; and yet two things are common to all of them: the moral tendency and a sense of humour. By this I do not mean morality in the vulgar sense of retribution for evil, or of filial devotion, or the sentimental insistence upon "" every one living happily ever afterwards," and above all upon Jack marrying his Molly. "Franz Kafka's great love, Milena Jesenská, to whom he wrote his most passionate letters (Letters to Milena), was a beautiful, politically committed, enormously talented journalist. She took an early stand against the rise of Hitler, and as the head of an opposition newspaper, was arrested in 1939 and sent to the Nazi Concentration camp in Ravensbruck. There she met Margarete Buber-Neumann, a fellow political prisoner, also a writer and a victim of Nazism. A rare friendship developed between the two women. They made a pact: if both survived, they would write a book together; if only one made it, she would tell their story. SUMMARY:

Václav Havel, (born October 5, 1936, Prague, Czechoslovakia [now in Czech Republic]—died December 18, 2011, Hrádeček, Czech Republic), Czech playwright, poet, and political dissident who, after the fall of communism, was president of Czechoslovakia (1989-92) and of the Czech Republic (1993-2003).

Havel's first new play in more than 20 years—Odcházení (Leaving), a tragicomedy that draws on his experiences as president and presents a chancellor leaving his post while grappling with a political enemy—premiered in 2008. **AUTHOR: Karel Čapek** LEADER:

SUMMARY.

From the internationally acclaimed Czech writer Karel Čapek comes this beautifully written and marvelously apt account of the trials and tribulations of the gardener's life. First published in Prague in 1929, The Gardener's Year combines a richly comic portrait of life in the garden, narrated month by month, with a series of delightful illustrations by the author's older brother and collaborator, Josef, Capek's gardeners—all too human, despite their lofty aspirations—often look the fool, whether they be found sopping wet, victims of the cobralike water hose, or hunched over, hands immersed in the soil, "presenting their rumps to the splendid azure sky." In their repeated folly. Capek gives us not only cause for laughter but also, in the end, "testimony of the imperishable and miraculous optimism of the human race." (Source: Amazon.com)

MONTH: October 31, 2023 BOOK: A Gothic Soul (1900/2015) AUTHOR: Jiří Karásek ze Lvovic LEADER: Layne Pierce, M.A., MLS **SUMMARY:** 

A Gothic Soul is the most acclaimed work of Czech Decadent prose. Expressing concerns that are unique to the Czech movement while alluding creatively and ironically to Joris-Karl Huysman's Against Nature, the novella is set in Prague, which is portrayed as a dead city, a city peopled by shades, who, like the protagonist – a nihilist and the "last scion of a noble line" – are only a dim reflection of the city's medieval splendor. The man lives in a dreamworld, the labyrinth of his soul giving rise to visions. In his guest for meaning, he walks the city, often hallucinating, while pondering questions of religious fervor and loss of faith, the vanity of life, his own sense of social alienation, human identity and its relationship to a "nation," the miserable situation of the Czechs under Habsburg rule, and Prague's loss of its soul on the cusp of modernity as old sections, such as much of the squalid Jewish Quarter, are demolished to make way for gaudy new buildings and streets. With a history of madness running in the family and afraid the same fate awaits him, he ultimately retreats into seclusion, preferring the monastic way of life as the epitome of unity and wholeness and a tonic to present-day fragmentation. Yet Karásek eschews the mawkish, opting instead for darker tones that play with the tropes and motifs of Decadence while conflating the same-sex desires of his protagonist, the fatalism and futility of such an existence within the social construct of the day, with concerns for the dual fates of his nation and city. MONTH: November 28, 2023 BOOK: Purrkin the Talking Cat (1935 Czech; 1966 English) **AUTHOR: Josef Lada** LEADERS: Tom Zumpfe, P.D. & Cathleen Osiziy, B.A. SUMMARY:

In this children's book, Peter, a village boy, teaches his cat, Purrkin, to talk and Purrkin then teaches the pig and the goat. They have many splendid adventures. Sadly, the cat's name was reassigned from Mikes to Purrkin in the translation. Lada wrote and illustrated several books on the adventures of Mikeš, a little black cat who could talk. This one is translated into English

Josef Lada (1887-1957) was an artist, illustrator and writer. The leaders will introduce you to Josef Lada, the man, and his incredible contributions to Czech culture. In his career he illustrated over 200 books, some fairytale anthologies for children, others like Ŝvejk, intended for grown ups. Lada is credited with over 15,000 illustrations. He worked as a cartoonist for several newspapers and became famous for his landscapes and village paintings which ended up in private collections. (Source: Leader's Description)
