MONTH: January 28, 2025 BOOK: *Miracle Game* (1972) AUTHOR: Josef Skvoreky LEADER: Layne Pierce SUMMARY:

Josef Skvoreky's Miracle Game was published in 1972 and translated into English in 1990 by Paul Wilson.

Moving between 1948, when our hero Danny Smiřický falls asleep in church while a miraculous event occurs, and 1968, when he observes the miracle of Prague Spring, The Miracle Game is a sharp look at the strange, sad, and silly things people do to survive.

MONTH: February 25, 2025 PLAY: *The Mother* (1938) AUTHOR: Karel Capek LEADER: Míla Šašková-Pierce SUMMARY:

"The Mother" is a 1938 anti-war drama written by the famous Czech novelist, Karel Capek. Heavily influenced by the Spanish civil war, the play portrays the relationships between men going off to war, and their families and mothers who want them to stay. It explores fascism and freedom, and conveys the suffering that war brings with it. Karel Capek (1890 - 1938) was an early twentieth century Czech writer who is most remembered for his significant influence on the genre of science fiction. Source: Amazon.com

MONTH: March 25, 2025 BOOK: Closely Watched Trains (1965) AUTHOR: Bohumil Hrabal LEADER: Andrea Volf SUMMARY:

Bohumil Hrabal's post-war classic about a young man's coming of age in Nazi occupied Bohemia is among his most beloved and accessible works. *Closely Watched Trains* is the subtle and poetic portrait of MioS Hrma, a timid young rainorad apprentice who insulates himself with fantasy against a reality filled with cruelty and grief. Day after day as he watches trains fly by, he torments himself with the suspicion that he himself is being watched and with fears of impotency. Hrma finally affirms his manhood and, with a sense of peace and purpose he has never known before, heroically confronts a trainload of Nazis.

Milan Kundera called the novel "an incredible union of earthly humor and baroque imagination." After receiving acclaim as a novel, *Closely Watched Trains* was made into an internationally successful film that won the Academy Award for Best Foreign Film of 1967. This edition includes a foreword by Josef Skvorecký.

MONTH: April 29, 2025

BOOK: Love Letter in Cuneiform The Margellos World Republic of Letters (2016) AUTHOR: Tomáš Zmeškal LEADER: Hana Walsserova, Ph.D. SUMMARY:

Love Letter in Cuneiform (The Margellos World Republic of Letters). Translated by Alex Zucker, currently the most prominent translator of the Czech literature, will also join us for the book presentation.

Set in Czechoslovakia between the 1940s and the 1990s, Tomáš Zmeškaľ s stimulating novel focuses on one family's tragic story of love and the unspoken. Josef meets his wife, Květa, before the Second World War at a public lecture on Hittle culture. Květa chooses to marry Josef over their mutual friend Hynek, but when her husband is later arrested and imprisoned for an unnamed crime, Květa gives herself to Hynek in return for help and advice. The author explores the complexities of what is not spoken, what cannot be said, the repercussions of silence after an ordeal, the absurdity of forgotten pain, and what it is to be an outsider.

MONTH: May 27, 2025 BOOK: *Early Days of Wilber Businesses* (2023) AUTHOR: Doris Koll LEADER: Doris Koll SUMMARY

C. D. Wilber platted the town of Wilber, Nebraska in 1872, and the town was named in honor of its founder. In January of that year, the first train arrived in town, coinciding with the construction of the town's inaugural boarding house. C. D. Wilber himself constructed a dwelling house and a frame hotel, dubbed the Wilber House, and the town was up and running.

Within three years, the population of the precinct had exploded to 800 people. This book describes the challenges of establishing a town, including many fires and the struggles to contain them, the grasshopper plagues and dust storms, and the ambitions of the people to overcome these hardships. Included in the book are over 150 pictures and 450 surnames from the businesses over the years.

MONTH: June 24,2025 BOOK: The Seven Churches (1999) AUTHOR: Miloš Urban LEADER: Linda Taborek SUMMARY:

A bloody, atmospheric modern classic of crime literature and one of the most haunting and terrifying thrillers to come out of Europe in recent years

Written in the spirit of the sensational murder story and combined with a rich Gothic atmosphere, this tale, now translated into 11 languages, traces the steps of a killer through the seven cathedrals of modern day Prague. The narrator, a policeman known simply as K, witnesses a bizarre accident followed by a series of mysterious murders. This event triggers a series of meetings with Gothic characters who appear to be trying to reconstruct the medieval "golden age" of Prague in the reign of Charles IV under the noses if its modern-day inhabitants. The bock's bloody and nightmarish plot will dazzle readers of thrillers, but ultimately the novel is much more—it's a brilliant postmoderm interpretation of the historical topography of late-medieval Prague and a vision of a civilization in decline. MONTH: July 29,2025 BOOK: The Jews of Bohemia & Moravia (1992) AUTHOR: Wilma Iggers LEADER: Lorraine Duggin, Ph.D. SUMMARY:

While much has been written about East European and German Jewry, relatively little attention has been given to the Jews of Bohemia and Moravia, although they played an important role in the industrial, economic, and cultural life of central Europe. This book examines the social and cultural history of the Jewish community in Czechoslovakia from the Age of Enlightenment to the middle of the twentieth century.

From family histories, newspaper and magazine articles, wills, and letters, Wilma Iggers has culled descriptions of life, customs, and local color, portrayals of important individuals and families; stories of individuals depicting the transition of a culture and a people from the Middle Ages to modern times; an examination of complaints about the deterioration of the religious communities and of religious instruction; and the history of anti-Semitism. Practically all reports reflect the difficult struggle for survival as Jews. The texts also address special legislation regarding the Jews, industrialization and urbanization, changes in religious and familial structures, growing involvement in the culture and politics of the worldly communities, cultural assimilation, changes in stereotypes about the Jews, and the effects of political forces from outside. MONTH: August 26, 2025 MOVIE: Polišky (Cosy Dens) (1999) AUTHOR: Petr Šabach, Patr Jarchovský LEADER: Petr Just, Ph.D.

SUMMARY:

Annotation: Bittersweet film comedy taking place in Prague in the years 1967-1968 characterized by short-lived attempt to reform the Communist system. The story revolves around two families living in one house and led by fathers with diametrically opposing political views. On the eve of Soviet intervention to Czechoslovakia in August 1968 the families are united by a marriage, but after the intervention the lives of both families dramatically change. The presentation will set the movie to the context of political and social development in late 1960s. (From Petr Just, Ph.D.)

MONTH: September 30, 2025 BOOK: Louis D Brandels: American Prophet (2016) AUTHOR: Jeffrey Rosen LEADER: Lois Shimerda Rood SUMMARY:

According to Jeffrey Rosen, Louis D. Brandeis was "the Jewish Jefferson," the greatest critic of what he called "the curse of bigness," in business and government, since the author of the Declaration of Independence. Published to commemorate the hundredth anniversary of his Supreme Court confirmation on June 1, 1916, Louis D. Brandeis: American Prophet argues that Brandeis was the most farseeing constitutional philosopher of the twentieth century. In addition to writing the most famous article on the right to privacy, he also wrote the most important Supreme Court opinions about free speech, freedom from government surveillance, and freedom of thought and opinion. And as the leader of the American Zionist movement, he convinced Woodrow Wilson and the British government to recognize a Jewish homeland in Palestine. Combining narrative biography with a passionate argument for why Brandeis matters today. Rosen explores what Brandeis, the Jeffersonian prophet, can teach us about historic and contemporary questions involving the Constitution, monopoly, corporate and federal power, technology, privacy, free speech, and Zionism. MONTH: October 28, 2025 PLAY: The Memorandum (1965) AUTHOR: Václav Havel LEADER: Brenda Davis

The play is a black comedy that parodies bureaucracy and conformity. Havel wrote it prior to the Prague Spring of 1968 as an ironic satire dissenting against communist rule. Despite its veiled themes, the play was approved by government censors and published. *The Memorandum* centers on the introduction of a new language, "Ptydepe", that is meant to make work more efficient despite having the opposite effect. MONTH: November 25, 2025 BOOK: Prague in Black & Gold (1997) AUTHOR: Peter Demetz LEADERS: Maurice & Beveriy Vonasek SUMMARY:

The author, Peter Demetz, does an excellent job of telling the somewhat obscure history of Prague. It may appear to be a bit like a history book on the surface, but it is not, as it provides for more of a deep explanation of what made Prague. The book provides an intellectual, artistic, and literary history of the city and tells the story of the three major communities: Czech, German, Jewish with some Italian influence. The collaborations and conflicts of these communities are exposed to the reader to better understand the large number of languages and their dialects being problematic... as is with any melting pot society. In the early years we are reminded there was no true "Czech" language. The author stated, "Prague has always been a dual or triple city, and its topography has changed with the language that was spoken and the religion that was espoused." The effects of Jan Hus and the Hussite revolution and the religion that was espoused." The effects of Jan Hus and the Hussite revolution and the impact of the Thirty Years War are covered as well as the various rulers such as Ottokar II, Charles IV, RudofI II and the roles they played in the Holy Roman Empire and the role of the Habsburgs. Prague (Praha) is a most unique, beautiful and loving city to experience firsthand.
