## **2024 WINNER—THE KUCERA AWARD**

The Dr. Vladimir Kucera Award is given to individuals within our state that have promoted, and preserved our Czech heritage. Dr. Kucera was a historian for the State Historical Society, and head of the Czech language and culture department at UNL. He taught Czech language and culture at several small towns, and like the Czech pioneers, he prepared the seedbed for the seed that became the Nebraska Czechs, it's chapters, and their festivals.

#### From Deb Vocasek

This year our recipient is **Dan Sanley**. Dan spent his formative years in Surprise and Ulysses Nebraska. Dan's Czech heritage is from his mother, herself a daughter of a Czech immigrant. Dan created "Nebraska Bohemians" on Facebook with over 70,000 followers interested in their Czech heritage and ancestry from all over the United States, and the Czech Republic. Dan's posts include features on Nebraska towns and their history, posts also include Czech traditions and how they have evolved over the years. Language is also a topic of discussion with proper pronunciations and derivations from original linguistic intent. From his posting of the page, Dan created a book, "The Best of Nebraska Bohemians" in 2015. Dan compiled the book in honor of his Czech ancestors. Dan is a member of the Czech Language Foundation, and the Czech Culture and Education Foundation of Nebraska.

## **UNL Students visit Czech Republic and Germany**

Here are a few pictures from UNL students visiting Czech Republic and Germany taking a course on Czech and Central European History and Culture: Prague to Berlin. The students taking the course visited Prague, Plzen, Konopiste, Krivoklat, Krkonose highlands and former Sudetenland, Theresienstadt, and also Moravia and Silesia - Olomouc and Svaty Kopecek, Ostrava and ended in Berlin.

The course examined Czech and Central European History and Culture, its medieval and imperial past, and its complex transition from being the conflicted Soviet buffer zone into being a modern Central Europe with its differences. Via a series of lectures, experiential learning, and excursions, the course examined this central European country, and region; it explored geopolitical aspects, culture, history, including its medieval history, Nazism, Communism and Holocaust, or the story of US liberation of the western Bohemia, studied Prague culture and subculture or visited an opera and Roma musical festival. The course was to demonstrate that by learning of culture, history, language, and about its people one can grasp the story of Europe.

The course was co-sponsored by Czech Chab fund and History Belousek Fund, and students of Czech had their flights sponsored. One graduate student, who studies Czech and specializes in Central European History, had his trip fully sponsored. The course was led by Dr. Hana Waisserova, Czech and Central, European Studies and Dr. Alex Vazansky, History.

OUR LEADER: Dr. Petr Just (b. 1978) obtained his Ph.D. in Political Science at the Charles University in Prague, Czech Republic, where he has served as part-time Assistant Professor of Political Science since 2005. In 2006 he joined the Metropolitan University Praque (MUP). Czech Republic, as full-time Assistant Professor. He also served as MUP's Vice-Rector for Student Affairs in 2007-2013 and since 2013 he has been the Chair of MUP's Department of Political Science. His teaching engagements have included more than 20 shortterm visiting teaching positions at universities in Iceland, Slovakia, Lithuania, Romania, Slovenia, Cyprus, Germany, Hungary, Poland and Turkey.

His professional interests include mainly comparative politics (forms of government, coalitions, bicameralism, presidency) and political systems of the Czech Republic and Slovakia (and Czechoslovakia). He has authored or co-authored 9 monographs, 40 chapters in collective monographs and 40 scientific articles. He has actively participated at more than 80 scientific conferences, both international and domestic. Since 2015 Petr has served both as Vice-President of the Czech Political Science Association (CPSA) and member of Executive Committee of the Central European Political Science Association (CEPSA). In 2018 he was elected CEPSA's Secretary General. He is also member of the International Political Science Association (IPSA) and the American Political Science Association (APSA). Since 2006 he has provided almost 2000 political analysis, commentaries, and interviews for both Czech and foreign media.

His Nebraska connections date back to 1994 when he came as an exchange high school student to Lincoln. Nebraska. Since then he has visited Nebraska several times. During his 1999 stay he conducted research for the purpose of his Bachelor thesis on Nebraska unicameralism. During his 2018 and 2019 visits he gave guest lectures at the University of Nebraska - Lincoln within the UNL's Czech Program sponsored by the UNL's Department of Modern Languages and Literature, UNL's Komensky Club and Nebraska chapter of the Czechoslovak Society for Arts and Sciences.

Also, do find a safe place to keep those dusty family scrapbooks from that one crazy old aunt...you'll be surprised what you find in there. Above all, be patient in your research and the rewards will be fascinating.

# The (XVII) 17th World Gathering of Czech Sokol Organizations in Prague 2024

The rally week took place in Prague from June 30 to July 5, 2024. It celebrated 162 years since the founding of the Sokol organization. More than 20,000 trainees and more than 40,000 spectators arrived from all corners of the Czech Republic and from abroad. The Sokol Parade through Prague had more than 15,000 uniformed participants.

Sokol operates in 18 countries around the world. It was the Sokol in foreign countries that kept the tradition of gatherings at a time when the Sokol association was banned by the Communists after 1948.

The 2024 gathering was accompanied by other events such as a gala evening in the National Theater; the Sokol Gala in the O2 arena; a show of Sokol performance of sports; and dance performances by Sokol folklore ensembles. A total of 12 collective compositions were performed. In a previous newsletter, we talked a little about the CGSI Cemetery Project and said we would follow up with more information....well, here's the follow up we promised.

First, a little about the Czechoslovak Genealogical Society International organization. As the name implies, CGSI provides educational, cultural, historical, and genealogical resources and opportunities for its members to discover and enhance their heritage knowledge. Members can attend conferences, quarterly program webinars, regional meetups, and other benefits. With over 2,000 current members, you can learn more about joining this wonderful organization here: <a href="CGSI.org">CGSI.org</a>

# **Czech and Slovak Cemeteries** in North America

We can learn a lot about our ancestors and their history by studying or visiting the cemeteries near where they settled in North America. Finding these cemetery locations can sometimes be difficult and this is why CGSI is working diligently to help locate these honored places of rest. Thus, you now have an opportunity to see these locations on a map and also help add a location that is currently not known/listed. There are websites such as <a href="Findagrave">Findagrave</a> and <a href="Billiongraves">Billiongraves</a> that provide many cemetery locations & memorials, however through the efforts of CGSI, there is much more information available from a defined heritage perspective.

About the CGSI Czech and Slovak Cemetery Project....

Currently, there is a small group of volunteers that have been diligently searching and adding cemetery information for each state known to have Czech/Slovak interments, even if there is but one individual. We do this in honor of those ancestors passed and to aid those seeking to know their ancestors. Up until three months ago there were zero of these like cemeteries listed in Texas, today that state is on its way to being duly represented. Not surprising, Nebraska has and still does lead the nation in its Czech/Slovak cemetery representation...the mapping is truly amazing.

The goal of the Cemetery project is to create a list of cemeteries across North America that have significant Czech, Slovak, Rusyn, or German-Bohemian populations. This information and more is recorded on a spreadsheet that is then made into a map that is available to all CGSI members on the <a href="CGSI.org">CGSI.org</a> website.

You can click on the map of North America and pull up information about a given cemetery. Some of the information that is recorded for each cemetery on the map: the cemetery's various names over the years, the cemetery website, the year it was founded, whether it is an active cemetery, the address and longitude and latitude, whether it is affiliated with a church, as well as many other interesting facts not available anywhere else. Links to <a href="Find-A-Grave">Find-A-Grave</a> are provided for researching specific graves/memorials of those cemeteries.

Note, you do not need to be a CGSI member to look at or add cemeteries, however you will not be able to see in-depth details unless you are a member. Please keep in mind this is all work-in-progress.


Mr. President, wishing you a successful trip to Texas and a safe journey back home. Looking forward to welcoming you back soon.

## CZECH PRESIDENT VISITS TEXAS



The Czech president addressed several hundred people gathered in the Czech capital of Texas with these words. "For us Texas has the perfume of distance and freedom. Additionally it has a large Czech community. Today I came on a motorcycle to this meeting with countrymen in La Grange, the capital of the Czech Texas communities. It is very touching to hear Czech language in the United States, to eat the pastry, to see our costumes, and to observe American Czech traditions in the local environment. Eva and I thank you for the warm welcome and for keeping your Czech roots alive for future generations. This is very meaningful for us."

Petr Pavel has been Czechia's president since 2023. Before the presidency, he was the Chief of the General Staff of the Czech Armed Forces until 2015, and after he represented Czechia's in NATO.
