Sharing the Experience - What a great evening! Translator Alex Zucker joins Lincoln Czechs April Reading Circle!

On April 29, 2025 **Hana Waisserova**, **Ph.D.**, associate professor of Czech and Central European Studies at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, led our Reading Circle with a discussion of **Tomáš Zmeškal**'s international award winning book, **Love Letter in Cuneiform**, translated by **Alex Zucker**. Alex Zucker is currently the most prominent translator of Czech literature.

Alex Zucker attended our Zoom Circle meeting and shared his experience translating Zmeškal's book, his challenges and process of translating the Czech language into English, and some of his views on Czech literature. He was vibrantly engaged with our participants. BOOK: The Jews of Bohemia

& Moravia

While much has been written about East European and German Jewry, relatively little attention has been given to the Jews of Bohemia and Moravia, although they played an important role in the industrial, economic, and cultural life of central Europe. This book examines the social and cultural history of the Jewish community in Czechoslovakia from the Age of Enlightenment to the middle of the twentieth century.

From family histories, newspaper and magazine articles, wills, and letters, Wilma Iggers has culled descriptions of life, customs, and local color; portrayals of important individuals and families; stories of individuals depicting the transition of a culture and a people from the Middle Ages to modern times; an examination of complaints about the deterioration of the religious communities and of religious instruction; and the history of anti-Semitism. Practically all reports reflect the difficult struggle for survival as Jews. The texts also address special legislation regarding the Jews, industrialization and urbanization, changes in religious and familial structures, growing involvement in the culture and politics of the worldly communities, cultural assimilation, changes in stereotypes about the Jews, and the effects of political forces from outside.

The Jews of Bohemia and Moravia begins with the expulsion of the Jews from Prague by Empress Maria Theresa in 1744, an event which caused a shock that remained in the Jewish consciousness for a long time. The book concludes with texts from the middle of the twentieth century dealing with the most recent generation of Bohemian and Moravian Jews. Despite fluctuations and radical breaks, the time span from 1744 to 1952 constitutes a single unit that encompasses striking cultural and economic developments as well as anti-Semitism and cynicism unmatched even in the Middle Ages.

With their strong emotional ties to the land of their birth, Bohemian and Moravian Jews are closer to the Central and West Europeans than to the Jews from Eastern Europe. Although Jews are often criticized for adapting themselves easily to other countries--meaning that they have no real roots--their strong emotional ties to their countries of origin are clearly expressed in a number of documents included in this book.





My name is Maureen Halama, I'm a Wilber native, who has always enjoyed listening to, supporting, and creating music, especially polka! Growing up, I enjoyed taking piano lessons, and later learned how to play the button accordion from my dad, Galen Beck. My first polka music adventures were singing with Bob Blecha and the Bouncin' Czechs and participating in the Czech Concerts held at Doane in the late '90s and early 2000s with my dad. I currently enjoy playing drums, piano, saxophone, clarinet, and occasionally the accordion in area polka bands with my husband, Jon and our friends. I have been an instrumental and vocal music teacher for 13 years, and currently teach K-12 Vocal Music at Tri County Public Schools.

Jason Cadek will explain how to locate your ancestral village and navigate the Czech Archives and other valuable genealogical resources. The talk will focus on resources and methods to locate and research your ancestral Czech village, its history and your family's origins. A variety of resources are available online and in print to help identify, locate and research the village, parish and estate that your Bohemian and Moravian ancestors called home.

Jason Cadek is a semi-professional genealogist from Omaha, NE, and the current president of the Czechoslovak Genealogical Society International. Jason has had a passion for genealogy for more than 30 years, researching his own family, as well as communities in Central Nebraska and Omaha. His paternal grandfather's family came to Nebraska from three regions of the Czech lands in the 1880s. He is a member of the Great Plains Chapter of the Association of Professional Genealogists, Greater Omaha Genealogical Society, and LLCGS, as well as the Bohemian Cemetery Association, Sokol Omaha, and Omaha and Lincoln Czech Clubs.
