January 27, 2026 A Song for Bohemia (2024) BOOK:

AUTHOR: Anne Marie Kenny LEADER: Anne Marie Kenny

SUMMARY:

Prague in the 1990s, an extraordinary place and time. The Cold War had ended. The Berlin Wall had fallen. Soviet-bloc countries like Czechoslovakia had just liberated themselves. The atmosphere was intoxicating, the future unmapped. And Anne Marie Kenny was there-a singer-turned-entrepreneur. Her true-life story reads like fascinating fiction-enduring family tragedy, singing at 21 on the Champs lys es, enjoying an artistic career in Paris and Nice, and performing in Prague at the invitation of Vaclav Havel before moving there to start a business

A Song for Bohemia is a love song and a tribute to the spirit of the Czech people, a story of a personal and collective journey to freedom. With the voice of an impassioned artist, this memoir does not merely speak, it sings.

MONTH: February 24, 2026 BOOK: **Blood Inscriptions** (2022) **AUTHOR: Hillel J.** LEADER: Hillel J. Kleval

SUMMARY:

Although the Enlightenment had seemed to bring an end to the widely held belief that Jews murdered Christian children for ritual purposes, charges of the so-called blood libel were surprisingly widespread in central and eastern Europe on either side of the turn to the twentieth century. Well over one hundred accusations were made against Jews in this period, and prosecutors and government officials in Germany, Austria-Hungary, and Russia broke with long established precedent to bring six of these cases forward in sensational public trials. In Blood Inscriptions Hillel J. Kieval examines four cases—the prosecutions that took place at Tiszaeszlár in Hungary (1882-83), Xanten in Germany (1891-92), Polná in Austrian Bohemia (1899-1900), and Konitz, then Germany, now in Poland (1900-1902)—to consider the means by which discredited beliefs came to seem once again plausible.

Kieval explores how educated elites took up the accusations of Jewish ritual murder and considers the roles played by government bureaucracies, the journalistic establishment, forensic medicine, and advanced legal practices in structuring the investigations and trials. The prosecutors, judges, forensic scientists, criminologists, and academic scholars of Judaism and other expert witnesses all worked hard to establish their epistemological authority as rationalists, Kieval contends. Far from being a throwback to the Middle Ages, these ritual murder trials were in all respects a product of post-Enlightenment politics and culture. Harnessed to and disciplined by the rhetoric of modernity, they were able to proceed precisely because they were framed by the idioms of scientific discourse and rationality. Source: PennPress.org

SUMMARY:

The Great Patriotic Trip (Czech: Velký vlastenecký výlet) is a 2025 Czech documentary road movie by director Robin Kyapil, following three pro-Russian Czech citizens on a trip to Ukraine to confront their beliefs about the war, with the film exploring their skepticism towards mainstream media and exposing them to the reality of the conflict. It's a provocative film showcasing a journey of ideological challenge, revealing the stark contrast between pro-Russian narratives and the situation on the ground in Ukraine.

MONTH: April 28, 2026 BOOK: Echoes of Exile (2025) AUTHOR: Daniela Spenser

LEADER: Hana Walsserová, Ph.D.

SUMMARY:

Echoes of Exile reveals the seismic disruptions of twentieth-century European history through the intimate lens of one family's struggle to survive. Setting out to record the life of her mother, Ruth, Daniela Spenser unearthed personal facts and stories that additionally illuminate the shared traumas and experiences of millions of Czech. Polish, and German Jews who died in the Holocaust, as well as the stories of those who survived and lived under Communism and the Cold War. Her resulting work is a fascinating hybrid that combines family letters and interviews with deeply researched political history spanning from the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian Empire to the fall of the Berlin Wall.

MONTH: May 26, 2026

POETRY: Selected Poems by Jaroslav Selfert (1921) POET:

LEADER: Layne Pierce

SUMMARY

Layne Pierce will present three poems by the 1984 winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature, Jaroslav Seifert. He received the Nobel Prive "for his poetry which endowed with freshness." sensuality and rich inventiveness provides a liberating image of the indominable spirit and versatility of man." Seifert became a major voice in 20th century Czech literature, known for his lyricism and reflections of life, love and Prague.

MONTH: June 30, 2026

BOOK: The Memoirs of František Vavák, Farmer and Magistrate in Milčice

Layne Pierce and Dr. Míla Šašková-Pierce TRANSLATION: Layne Pierce and Dr. LEADER: Míla Šašková-Pierce

SUMMARY:

The Memoirs constitute a work by a self-educated farmer, village administrator (rychtář) and scribe, and folk philosopher, who conveyed his life experiences for his descendants. František Vavák (1746 – 1816) lived through wars, religious patents and economic reforms, abolishment of serfdom or corvée under the Austrian Emperor Joseph II (1780-1790), and corvée partial reinstatement under Leopold II (1790-1792). He describes his feelings of receiving freedom, and his disappointments when the fate took away from the peasants once again a part of their human dignity. Vavák describes famines, floods, and good times followed by bad harvests as they happened in his region of the Poděbrady imperial estate. Not only nature, but happenings of international reach had grave economic impacts on the lives of the local farmers who had to pay taxes, quarter armies, etc. Side by side with descriptions of weather and harvests, we read about births and deaths in the villages and among the aristocrats.

MONTH: July 28, 2026

BOOK: The Memoirs of a Prague Executioner (1817d)(2004-08) **AUTHOR: Josef Svátek**

LEADER: Lorraine Duggin, Ph.D.

SUMMARY:

A young man from a privileged family, Jan Mydlář, is about to graduate from medical school when a sudden shift of fate changes his life forever. He becomes stuck in the most detested profession for the rest of his life-an executioner. Master Jan Mydlář finds himself in the middle of historical events of Bohemia. The religious and political turmoil in the Habsburg empire reaches its climax in the beginning of the 17th century. When Protestant leaders throw imperial Catholic governors out of the window of their offices at the Prague Castle, a civil war between Protestants and Catholics in Bohemia breaks out. The civil war explodes into a European conflict that lasts thirty years and leaves much of Europe in ruins. In the 1621 White Mountain Battle at Prague, Protestant rebels are defeated by Catholic forces and Master Jan is to execute 27 rebel leaders, most of whom are his fellow Protestants and countrymen. In "The Memoirs of a Prague Executioner." Jan Mydlář describes how he went from a medical graduate to an executioner, gives an account of medieval crime and punishment, and explains the manners and values of late 16th and early 17th century society. The book deals with documented crimes of the time in a similar way as the work of François Gayot de Pitaval. The book contains graphic descriptions of medieval torture Source: Google Books

BOOK: Woodrow Wilson

and the Reimagining of Eastern Europe (2020)

AUTHOR: LEADER: Petr Just, Ph.D.

The presentation will focus on selected aspects of the creation of Czechoslovakia in 1918 and, in particular, on the role played in this process by selected American politicians and diplomats. Emphasis will be placed not only on the well-known figures (such as the U. S. President Woodrow Wilson or Businessman and Ambassador Charles Crane), but also on those who have remained somewhat unjustly in the shadows and whose role is not so often the subject of scientific or popular texts.

MONTH: September 29, 2026
Forgotten Immigrants BOOK:

The Bohemians of Turners Falls, MA (2024)

AUTHOR: LEADER: James Bridgman

SUMMARY:

The Bohemians of Turners Falls, Massachusetts, began life as serfs on the estates of wealthy nobles in the heart of Europe. Fleeing their homeland to escape poverty and mandatory military service, they crossed the ocean in the bowels of immigrant ships, chasing the dream of a better

But conditions in a small factory village in rural New England were almost as harsh as they had been in Bohemia. Life in the tenements was crowded. Work in the dust-laden air of the local cutlery led to grinder's consumption and an early grave. Children fell prey to the grim reaper at an alarming rate. The immigrants soon learned that the streets of America were not paved with gold.

This book uncovers the lost story of the courageous pioneers from Bohemia who gave up everything they knew to start life again in a small New England village.

MONTH: October 27, 2026 PLAY: **R.U.R.** (1921) (2021) **AUTHOR: Karel Čap** LEADER: Brenda Davis

"R.U.R." (Čapek: Rossumovi univerzální roboti) is a science fiction play originally written in the Czech language. It premiered in 1921 and is noted for introducing the term "robot" to the English language. The play begins in a factory that makes artificial people called "robots." Unlike the modern usage of the term, these creatures are closer to the modern idea of androids or even clones, as they can be mistaken for humans and can think for themselves. They seem happy to work for humans, although that changes and a hostile robot rebellion leads to the extinction of the human race. After finishing the manuscript. The author realized that he had created a modern version of the Jewish Golem legend. He later took a different approach to the same theme in War with the Newts, in which non-humans become a servant class in human society. Memorial of Czech Protestant Congregations BOOK:

In the U.S. (1900) (2012)

AUTHORS: Vilém Šiller, Václav Průcha, R. M. de Castello LEADER: Jason Cadek

SUMMARY:

Originally published in the Czech language in 1900 in Chicago, Illinois, this book documents and describes the early Czech and Slovak Protestant U.S. congregations. Reverend Jan Dus and his wife, Anna, from Polička in the Czech Republic, translated the book into English. An editing committee organized by Dave Pavelka made up of Tom Kajer, Mary Jane Scherdin, Dottie Speidel, and Ed Vavra assured the preservation of the original meaning yet made sure the text is understandable to modern readers

The hard cover volume of 294 pages has 137 black and white illustrations. It provides descriptions and histories of the congregations, lay leaders, and clergy of the included denominations which are: Presbyterian, Independent, Reformed, Congregational, (also some Slovak Congregational and Polish Congregational), Methodist, and Baptist.
