Dobry den. I'm Sinda Dux, the new newsletter editor. If items are not laid out just perfectly, it's because this is my first issue and I'm still learning. I've composed newsletters before, but it's been a long time. Lately I've been proofreading newsletters.

I'm Czech on my father's side and German on my mother's with one French ancestor and one Dutch. My Czech great-grandparents are Wenzel Henry Schelbitzki and Maria Krutova, Wenzel from Grosmerigthal, Zwickau, Bohemia, and Maria from Biskaupkah, Okresu Zberov, Bohemia. Wenzel spoke German and Maria spoke Bohemian but they communicated somehow and had 13 children. Wenzel immigrated to the US in 1870 at age 27 and homesteaded in Fillmore and Saline Counties. Little is known about Maria before she married Wenzel. Wenzel became a naturalized American citizen in 1876 and that made his wife Maria and their children US citizens, also. It makes me proud that my great-grandfather chose to become an American citizen.

Anne Marie Kenny



Anne Marie Kenny, an Omaha native, lived her early adult years in France as a professional singer, performing at the Paris Ritz and on television, radio, and film. When the Iron Curtain fell in 1989, she wrote a poem and sent it to newly elected President Václav Havel, who invited her to sing at the Reduta Club. Soon after, she moved to Prague and started a staffing and training company that would be ranked #2 in the Czech market. She lived and worked alongside Czechs discovering their place in a new democratic society, while coming to terms with their past under totalitarian rule. Her book ***A Song for Bohemia*** is a tribute to the spirit of the Czech and Slovak people, and the story of a personal and collective journey to freedom.

Martin Palouš



Martin Palouš is a sought-after international speaker and commentator in the field of freedom, democracy and human rights. He was one of the original signatories of Charter 77 and served as its spokesperson in 1986. In November 1989, he was among the founders of the Civic Forum. After the Velvet Revolution, he became a member of Parliament, Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs, and Ambassador of the Czech Republic to the U.S. and U.N. Today, he is on the board of supervisors of Václav Havel Library in Prague, director of International Cooperation of the Remembrance Society, member of the Council of the Institute for the Study of Totalitarian Regimes, and former board president of the Václav Havel Center in New York.

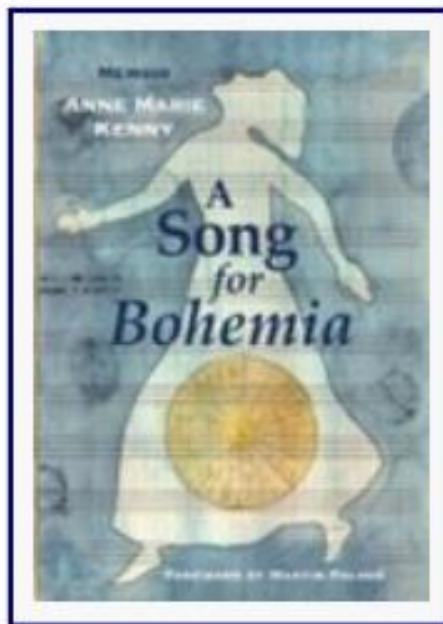
How to Register:

SUMMARY: *A Song for Bohemia* (2024)

Prague in the 1990s, an extraordinary place and time. The Cold War had ended. The Berlin Wall had fallen. Soviet-bloc countries like Czechoslovakia had just liberated themselves. The atmosphere was intoxicating, the future unmapped. And Anne Marie Kenny was there—a singer-turned-entrepreneur. Her true-life story reads like fascinating fiction—enduring family tragedy, singing at 21 on the Champs Elysees, enjoying an artistic career in Paris and Nice, and performing in Prague at the invitation of Vaclav Havel before moving there to start a business.

A Song for Bohemia is a love song and a tribute to the spirit of the Czech people, a story of a personal and collective journey to freedom. With the voice of an impassioned artist, this memoir does not merely speak, it sings.

AUTHOR/LEADER: Anne Marie Kenny

Anne Marie Kenny is a singer who has had an international career and voice instructor with her own Vocal Performance Studio in Omaha, Nebraska. She enjoys working with singers of all levels and ages, from accomplished professionals to beginners. Her students have won first or second place at NATS competitions. Her vocal method is based on a traditional bel canto technique mixed with an individualized contemporary approach to meet the interests and goals of each student. Besides the American musical theater and classical repertoire, her specialties are in French, Italian, and Czech music, pronunciation and diction. Anne Marie also works with public speakers on the speaking voice. She uses similar performance principles and healthy vocal techniques to optimize the speaker's message.

Anne-Marie is also a writer and has had articles and books published. As a singer, she continues to perform. For 20 years she lived in Europe, where she performed regularly at venues such as the Paris Ritz Hotel, the Monte Carlo Beach Regency, and Théâtre de Cannes. In Prague she was invited at the request of President Vaclav Havel to perform at the famous Reduta Club. Anne-Marie worked for 30 years with Janine Reiss of Paris, France, one of the greatest vocal coaches of our time. She has also taken courses and/or master classes at the École Normale de Musique de Paris, the Juilliard School of Music in New York, and the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore.

Anne-Marie is fluent in written and spoken French and has a working knowledge of Czech, Spanish and Italian.
